Interesting Ceremony Held Last Evening

H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte is Commissioned as ship; Many witness event.

The H.M.C.S. "Queen Charlotte" was the scene of an impressive commissioning ceremony last evening as the new ship was officially commissioned by His Honour, Lieutenant Governor B. W. LePage.

Captain N. W. Lowther, in a short address, explained the derivation of the new ship's name just before the commissioning pennant was presented by the Lieutenant Governor to Lieut. M. G. McCarthy, Officer Commanding the "Queen Charlotte".

Following the impressive ceremony on board ship and guests went on to the shore to witness the commissioning of the ship.

Hydman, members of the City Council, and a number of prominent citizens were among the guests at the ceremony.

The following is the text of the address delivered by Lieutenant Governor LePage:

"We are gathered here this evening to take part with the Officers and Men of the Royal Canadian Navy for the purpose of Commissioning His Majesty's Canadian Ship "Queen Charlotte".

It may be of interest to many of us to know that up to the present time this training ship has been classed as a Tender of His Majesty's Canadian Ship "Stadacona".

"I am informed that the advantages gained by this change is to do with greater efficiency and authority of the Commanding Officer.

The pennant, which is to be flown at the mast-head is a symbol by which this ship is known as a Commissioned Ship of His Majesty's Canadian Navy.

"In this great struggle for the freedom of mankind the citizens of this Province have reason to be proud of the large number who have volunteered for service in the Army, the Air Force and the Navy."

"At the request of the Commanding Officer, Lieutenant McCarthy, I have the honour to declare this Ship Commissioned, and given the name of His Majesty's Canadian Ship, "Queen Charlotte", and I trust that she may continue to be used in the training of young men for His Majesty's Forces, for the glory of God, and for the protection of the British Empire."

In explaining the derivation of the ship's name, Capt. N. W. Lowther spoke as follows:

"It is my pleasant duty tonight to say a few words to you to give you a greater insight into the reason why the name "Queen Charlotte" has been chosen for this Naval Barracks. Queen Charlotte is the name of the gracious consort of King George the Third and the great-great-great-grandmother of our present sovereign. It is a very fine custom that the Navy has of naming its ships after former sovereigns, famous admirals, and noted places and no more appropriate name could possibly have been chosen for the Naval Barracks here than the name "Queen Charlotte."

"This city of Charlottetown was named after Queen Charlotte 178 years ago. A portrait of this charming lady can be seen in the City Building by anyone who is interested. But returning to the name "Queen Charlotte" as applied to vessels of war, it will certainly be of interest to you to know that there was a ship called the "Queen Charlotte".

"This "Queen Charlotte" was a corvette built 133 years ago, and she took a prominent part in a sea battle on Lake Erie during the war of 1812-14. The Great Lakes were not accessible to English warships so each side found it necessary to build smaller ships to fight on the Great Lakes. Commander Barclay commanded the small naval force on Lake Erie and included in his command was the H.M.S. "Queen Charlotte". She was a ship of 400 tons net, was armed with 1 long 12 pdr. 2 long 9 pdrs, and 14 long 24 pdrs and carried a crew of 126. However this small fleet was engaged by a larger and more heavily armed enemy squadron and the 1st H.M.S. "Queen Charlotte" although valiantly going to the aid of the flagship was overpowered and her naval history ended.

"Thus after the lapse of 130 years we commemorate her name in the naming of these Naval Barracks and we know the name "Queen Charlotte" as applied to a naval barracks in the Town of Charlotteville is a source of inspiration and pride to a Company of the R.C.N.V.R. which takes second place to none in Canada for a record for smartness and efficiency and which has already sent a large number of splendid officers and men to serve in Canada's Navy and in the Royal Navy.

"I feel that nothing more can remain to be said to you when I express the hope that you will be as proud of your new name as the citizens of the Town of Charlotteville are of you.
