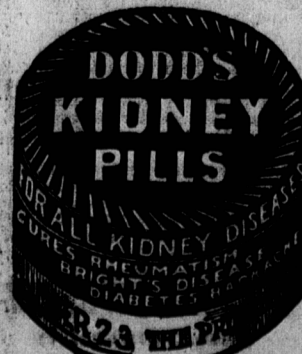
IN MEMORIAM
