NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—Tuesday was official gossip day in the United States, which American citizens may secure a legalized peek into their neighbors' affairs. Publication of income tax returns is permitted by law from September 1 to September 30.
 Despatches from many parts of the U. S. reveal interesting figures on the income tax payments made by reputedly wealthy people. Following are some of the payments:
