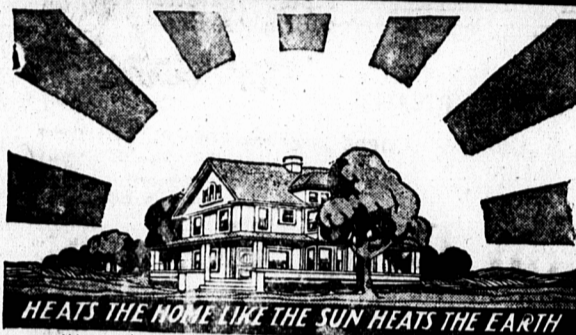

At The Abegweit Executive Meeting

The Abegweit Executive and Hockey Committee met yesterday afternoon to discuss hockey conditions, hear reports, etc., with regard to ways and means of furthering the campaign this winter.

A telegram was read from Joe Molanus, Manager of the Dalhousie Tigers, accepting the Abegweit's invitation to play a double-header here on the night of December 31st and the afternoon of New Year's Day.

The playing of the latter fixture in the afternoon will be an innovation in this city and should appeal to all lovers of Canada's National winter game. The playing of the game in the afternoon will enable those who have social or other engagements, to fill same and at the same time witness the hockey battle.

The "Tigers" won the Intercollegiate championship last year, also the Halifax City League series, but were forced to abandon any attempt to play off for the Maritime title, due to unavoidable college routine. Other Maritime centres have been negotiating with Dal for these dates, but the locals apparently were preferred, hence the fixtures.

The Hockey Committee this season will make a departure in style of uniforms and in all probability the team will be garbed in a sweater of vertical red and black stripes, black pants and red stockings. This is a new design and should look good from a spectator's point of view.

Notice was given that the Abegweit Club was intending to register all its hockey athletes, and a list of nearly forty players has been prepared for whom registration cards and playing certificates will be secured.

The Association has decided to open up a secretary's office where meetings of the Board of Directors, conferences with the athletic teams and secretarial work will be carried on. The club's equipment, supplies, etc., will also be stored there.

The game with Dalhousie scheduled for New Year's, the meeting said, is to be a forerunner of many on the other hand, the Abegweits have already been invited to play in numerous Maritime towns. It is also the intention of the club to send the team to Boston later in the season.

Hockey practice was announced to take place Wednesday evening. This being the initial work-out of the season, a large attendance is expected.

Great preparations are being made for the big Abegweit dance advertised in this paper to take place Thursday night at the Casino. This annual dance in aid of the club has always been a huge success and Thursday night's affair has every promise of being even more successful.

Damaged Vessel Is Towed To New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—With her head gear carried away in a collision with three-masted schooner Edwin G. Farrar was towed into port last night. The schooner collided with the tanker Miller County, eight miles east of Long Branch, N. J., the steamer carrying away her bowsprit.

In southern waters, coastguard craft were continuing their search for the yacht Miramar, which, it was revealed today, had not been heard from since Nov. 30. The Miramar is owned by E. M. Statter, New York hotel man, and had a crew of 11.

Declares Dominion Is Losing Much Money

(Canadian Press)

TORONTO, Dec. 14.—Commenting on the export statistics which show that the bulk of Canadian grain transported to Europe is shipped via United States ports, C. B. Watts, a Toronto authority on wheat said today:

"Immense sums of money are being lost to Canada and we will go on losing it just as long as those in control of the situation are asleep. It is time some people woke up."

"I have given the matter a good deal of thought, but I am not going to say anything about it until there is some sign of action being taken," he declared. "Giving my opinion now would just be wasting it on the desert air. The export of Canadian wheat through the United States is something that cannot be controlled by legislation." D. A. Campbell of the Maple Leaf Milling Company stated today. "It is impossible to legislate against geography. The minute an official measure is used to force the wheat export to flow out of its natural channel we are courting danger."

Prof. McLennan Visions Super-fuel

TORONTO, Dec. 15.—Elimination of the fuel problem of modern life by development of a fuel, the power of which would be many thousand times that of anything at present known to science, was predicted by Prof. McLennan, head of the Department of Physics of the University of Toronto, and the atomic theory, in a statement here.

Working from the fact that it was now possible to manufacture helium from hydrogen and at the same time produce enormous amounts of energy, Prof. McLennan believed, would ultimately enable scientists to produce the super-fuel which would be the panacea for all transportation and fuel problems. He pointed out that it should be theoretically possible to begin with hydrogen and instead of destroying only part of the matter and producing helium, to destroy the whole and so produce mechanical power. Professor McLennan stated that by so doing heat sufficient to bring four cubic miles of water to the boiling point, it is believed can be generated from a small quantity of hydrogen, the cubic size of which would be no longer than that of the human body.

Live Stock Market

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Dec. 15.—Dominion live stock report fresh receipts of live stock on the two markets this morning amounted to 149 cattle, 96 calves, and in addition there were 150 cattle left over from yesterday. Sales today were confined mostly to small stock and few canners and cutters. The canners brought \$2.25 and cutters and common cows \$2.75 to \$3.25. Common quality veal calves brought \$10 to \$11 and a few better ones a shade better. Lambs were harder to sell and prices were lower on most lots. Small lots of fairly good lambs sold for \$12.50 and \$13, and common lambs \$11.50 to \$12. Hogs were about steady. Selects were quoted at \$13.75 and mixed lots good quality hogs \$13.25 and one load of real good hogs brought \$13.50 from a local butcher. Sows were \$10.50 to \$11.

Cardinal Scores Meddling Persons

BOSTON, Dec. 15.—The cornerstone of Christian civilization is not puritanism, nor prohibition, nor meddling in other person's business or interfering with their private lives, but charity, William Cardinal O'Connell declared in an address here today. He scored the person of puritanical, meddling, restrictive temperament as one whose viewpoint is one-sided and intolerant. Citing the so-called Blue Laws of the present generation as instances where this type had run wild, Cardinal O'Connell said:

"You cannot but admire their sterling desire to become puritan, but they took the wrong road. They would eliminate all pleasure. Nearly every one of these persons has gone to excess in the matter of wine. Those who seek to impose their will and ideas on the world will not succeed."
