#### PRESIDENT HARDING'S FATHER MARRIED

**MARION, O., Aug. 14.—Dr. Geo.** T. Harding, father of President Harding, and Miss Alice Severns, his stenographer, who were married on Thursday at Monroe, Mich., first went to Windsor, Ont., with the object of having the ceremony performed in that city, but failed to get a license because they were not residents of Canada. Scores of surprised townsfolk today personally tendered best wishes to the venerable physician and his bride, both of whom are well known by the majority of Marion residents. First official announcement of the marriage was telegraphed to President Harding late Thursday night by an employee of his newspaper, the Marion Star. Dr. Harding, who is 77 years old has been a practicing physician in Marion for 53 years. His bride was born in Minoa County 52 years ago. Dr. Harding has five living children. His first wife died 11 years ago.

#### COMING TO CANADIAN UNIVERSITY

**LONDON, England, Aug. 14—Sir** Arthur Currie, is recommending to the Governors of McGill University the appointment to the Chair of History of Basil Williams who last year succeeded at Oxford, the annually elected Ford Lecturer in History, such eminent men as Milland, Stephen, Land and Pirth. Basil Williams' biography of Cecil Rhodes, just published, and his life of William Pitt, Earl of Chatham, are regarded as standard works. Sir Arthur told the correspondent that he especially favors his appointment because Mr. Williams is a modernist, specializing in the history of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

## Three Additional Suspects in McAuley Case

**ST. JOHN, Aug. 15.—The week-** end passed without any additional clues being located in the search for the murderer of little Sadie McAuley. The rumor in connection with the mysterious man at Paklok was run to earth and it was found to be only a salesman who thought that the mob was chasing him. The police department received three photographs on Saturday of suspects being held in Montreal, St. Stephen and Halifax, but owing to absence from the city the little girls who had accompanied the victim it cannot be determined whether or not they are the picture of the criminal until today. The detectives do not believe that the descriptions received so far from other outside places tally with that of the murderer. The department still is engaged in running down rumors which are being received daily, but so far without result. The Moncton police are also investigating several rumors there according to advice received Saturday night but no arrests have been made yet.

The search in the vicinity of Pokok, which so aroused the citizens on Thursday night, was finally concluded on Saturday morning. It was found that a resident of Victoria street, who is employed in the gas works, thought that the crowd was in pursuit of him on account of his acceptance of employment there and he ran to the woods. He returned to his home Saturday morning, but did not notify the detectives until he ferreted out his identity themselves and he finally admitted the fact when questioned. The search of the woods in that vicinity was immediately called off.

A man was arrested early Saturday morning but later was able to satisfy the detectives of his innocence and was allowed to depart. No arrests were made on Saturday afternoon, but another man was interviewed at his home and eliminated from the list of suspects.

The arrival of three photographs of men being held on suspicion at Montreal, St. Stephen and Halifax added another feature to the situation. The detectives viewed these and compared them with the description but would not give out any information until after the little girls see the pictures this morning. They announced, however, that the descriptions of men being held at Newcastle, Summerside and North Sydney, did not answer very closely that of the wanted criminal. It also was announced that the description of a suspect in Sackville, who was not arrested, did not seem to tally closely with that of the criminal.

The local department has sent circulars broadcast containing the description of the suspected criminal and the notice that \$500 reward would be paid for the arrest of the murderer.

#### Rubber King Dead

**BRISTOL, R. I., Aug. 14.—Col.** Samuel P. Colt, for many years president of the United States Rubber Co., died of paralysis at his home here yesterday. At the time of his death he was chairman of the board of directors of the company. Development of the rubber business in this country, a record as interesting as that of steel, charged Colonel Samuel Pomeroy Colt from a successful lawyer to a "captain of industry." He was the organizer of the United States Rubber Company, a consolidation of numerous concerns with a combined capital of \$75,000,000 and about 30,000 employees in Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.

#### 50 KIDDIES LOST EACH MONTH

**WINNIPEG, Aug. 14.—Police** figures issued today show that an average of 50 children are lost each month on the streets of Winnipeg. Most of them are found wandering on streets with the heaviest traffic. The policemen who find them and who enact the role of mother until the real mothers apply to the police station for their offspring, seldom complain about the arduous work which devolves upon them in taking care of their charges.

"It will give me most genuine pleasure to forward to His Majesty, who is your Patron, these expressions of your devotion which I have just heard. To obtain that victorious conclusion we now realize more acutely than ever that it has cost us far more than the lives of the many good men who died. All the countries of our Empire have spent largely from their resources. The necessity for retrenchment causes inevitable distress, and it is to such associations as yours that we must look for an example in assisting Canada through the difficult period of reconstruction, until we reach again healthy and prosperous times."

## 30,000 Still Living In Wartime Trenches

**ST. JOHN, Aug. 15.—More than** 30,000 Ukrainians are still living in the trenches dug in Galicia during wartime by the armies of Russia, Poland, Austria, Ukraina and other belligerents according to Archbishop Szeptycki of Lemberg who, after having been a guest for two days at the Palace here, left last evening for Montreal to continue his tour of Canada, the United States, and possibly South America to seek aid for the promotion of the spiritual and material welfare of his war-stricken people. Seven times in seven years, His Grace said opposing armies in offensives and counter-offensives had swept across the face of the country, destroying wealth and property and lacerating the land with ugly gaping trenches. In the wake of the four wars in which his unhappy land had been engaged during the last seven years had followed hunger, disease and poverty so that now people deprived of their homes had neither money nor materials to construct new ones; hunger stalked through the land with black typhus had taken its heavy toll of human life and fifty per cent of the children of the country were dying of hunger and lack of nourishment. Unless America came to the aid of his unhappy land the hopes of a brighter day could not be entertained by his stricken people, His Grace said. The harvest this year would be of good quality but of insufficient amount to feed the population. Agriculture could not be carried on in the large scale on which it was in the days before the war because of the difficulties put in the way of cultivation by the trenches that were dug all over the country.

#### 600-POUND PETRIFFIED BODY FOUND IN TENNESSEE

**KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 14.—**Further information as to the petrified body of gigantic proportions found near Helenwood, in Scott County, Tennessee, was received here today. Cruise Sexton, of Helenwood, found the "devil" as he calls it, on July 20 last while prospecting for coal. The formation was five feet underground. It weighed some thing like 500 pounds. The freak is described as having a head of abnormal size adorned by horns, resembling those of a ruminant. Its mouth is of unusual size, with 24 prominent front teeth. The arms are of unusual length, with enormous hands. A chain, resembling an ordinary trace chain, encircles the neck. Long wings of brownish color reach from the shoulders almost to the ankles. The print of the left hand is plainly visible on the chest. Sexton believes the object may be an image of an old tribe of Indians or cliff dwellers.

#### RUSSIA REVOKES FREE SERVICES TO ALL CITIZENS

**RIGA, Aug. 15.—Formal decision** to revoke free postal, railway telegraph, and tramway service in Soviet Russia, together with the investigation of the report, here disclosed, which would lead them to make an arrest. These important steps toward putting into effect Lenin's new policy, which are taken as an indication that his plan is moving still further in the direction of the industrial and capitalistic systems of the rest of the world than was at first believed, are announced in decrees to the people's commissars, signed by Lenin. Detailed instructions drafted by the council of commissars after a consultation with the various trade organizations, show that only the big industries will remain under national management; the others will be left to the co-operative movement instead of the exchange of goods, are announced in despatches by the trade unions.

The decision to charge for the postal, tramway and other services, was made, says the Rosta Agency, "to restore the value of the currency." By another decree the Government organizations are instructed to secure payment for everything furnished workmen, except for food rations and medicine given those having cards. This is interpreted as meaning a great curtailment of the free ration list through strict limitation of cards to actual workmen, who will be subjected to collective rationing, factories or departments to receive a food supply based on their output, irrespective of the number of employees. A message to the Riga Rundschau from Moscow states that the taxes in Russia will be payable in money.
