

VEAL SOUFFLE.

Melt one-third cupful of butter, add one-third cupful of flour and stir until well blended; then pour on gradually two cupfuls of scalded milk. Bring to the boiling point and add one-half cupful of soft, stale bread crumbs, one teaspoonful of salt and one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper, and let simmer two minutes. Remove from fire and add two cupfuls of cold, cooked veal, finely chopped, one tablespoonful of finely chopped parsley and the yolks of three eggs, then cut and fold in the whites of three eggs, beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into buttered individual moulds, set in a pan of hot water or a buttered pudding dish, cover with buttered paper, and bake in a slow oven until firm. Remove from moulds, garnish and pour around a white mushroom sauce.

LAMB CUTLETS WITH CUCUMBERS. "New Citron, Orange, and Lemon Peels at Beer & Goff's." Trim the desired number of small cutlets and fry in butter until thoroughly cooked and brown. Peel a large cucumber in boiling salt and water until almost cooked. Drain and put into a saucepan with a tablespoonful of melted butter. Toss over the fire until quite tender. Season with salt and cayenne pepper. Add half a teaspoonful of minced parsley. Dish the cutlets in a circle on a hot dish, arranging the cucumbers in the centre. Make a brown gravy from the butter in which the cutlets and cucumbers were cooked, and serve separately.
