HORSEMEN FURNISH GREAT AFTERNOONS SPORT YESTERDAY

Devilset Lowered The Maritime Track Record For Three Year Olds To 2.17 2-5. Bingen Aubrey Steps One Of The Fastest Miles Ever Trotted Over This Track In 2.12 1-2. Captain Jackson Lowers His Mark To 2.15 2-5. Igo Purchased By Monte Gerow. Ideal Weather And Large Attendance.

Quite a large number of people witnessed the trials of speed at the Charlottetown Driving Park yesterday afternoon. The weather was ideal and the track lightning fast. Captain Jackson, owned by Mr. Chas. Chandler of City, was the first horse to try to lower the record. Driven by his owner he trotted a splendid mile, lowering his record from 2.17 1/4 to 2.15 2-5. The next event on the program was a friendly contest between The Yank driven by Ernest McTague and Donna Harvester driven by Col. MacKinnon. The Yank trotted beautifully and won by a length and a half. Time 2.13 3-5. A little later in the afternoon these two hooked up again, Donna Harvester winning by a head in 2.14 3-5. The next event was the attempt of Igo owned by Willard Kelly and driven by Monte Gerow to beat 2.20. The Pup at his wheel, he stepped the half in 1.08 1/2 and completed the mile in 2.15 flat. The Pup a close second. Briar Mac and Capt. Jackson then had a friendly tilt. At the 3-4 pole Capt. Jackson's tire became unloosened and retarded him so that he had to be brought to a walk. Briar Mac completed the mile in 2.16 2-5. The next event was one that was looked forward to with great interest, namely the attempt of Devilset by Longset to break the record of 2.19 3/4 which he established at the Exhibition race track for Bingen Aubrey at his wheel he stepped the fast quarter in 35 seconds, the half in 1.09 4-5 and the trotting record in 2.12 1-2, a new maritime record and only one second behind the Canadian trotting record made at Toronto, Ont., a few weeks ago. This beautiful trotter is out of the famous Devilish Dorothy 2.16 1-4 up and is an indication that these horses campaigned they would acquire still faster records.

The final event on the program was the effort against time by The Pup. As mentioned previously he had made a great effort with Igo, but in his own heat he made a break which prevented him from getting a fast record. The mile was in 2.19 1-5, nothing near what he can do. After the races a representative of the horsemen thanked the people for their attendance, the officials for their splendid conduct of the meeting and the directors of the Charlottetown Driving Park Association for sponsoring the afternoon's sport. Yesterday certainly demonstrated that there are some remarkable horses on P. E. Island if they were campaigned. Yesterday's efforts show that the previous week's racing had the effect of keying them up and is an indication that these horses campaigned they would acquire still faster records.
