J. CHARLES MORAN

Citizens learned with surprise and regret yesterday of the passing of J. Charles Moran in his 61st year whose death occurred at his home early this morning after a long illness.

The late Mr. Moran, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael Moran, was well and favorably known not only in the city but throughout the entire province. As a former business executive he was known to many of our citizens with whom he came in contact as one who was honest in all his dealings and whose word was his bond.

For a number of years he was a prominent member of the old Abegweit Club and was a tower of strength to the football and hockey teams, on the latter of which he was a star goal keeper. Previous to his membership in the Abegweit Club he was a member of the old Anchor Club, a member of the St. Dunstons Baseball and a member of the Charlottetown Council Knights of Columbus.

The deceased was, until late years prominent in the militia holding the rank of Sergeant Major in the Artillery on his retirement from that body.

For a number of years he was employed with Moore and McLeod and later with the late Sixtus McMillan, as a bookkeeper, resigning from the latter position to accept the position of manager with C. Lyons and Company. After the death of Mr. Lyons, he continued as manager until ill health forced him to resign, about three years ago.

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IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOSEPH A. CHISHOLM

Another valued link between the present and the last generation was severed by the hand of death when, on January 26th, 1944, Joseph A. Chisholm of Ugg passed away at his home in St. John's, Newfoundland, at the age of 84 years.

Joe as he was familiarly called, was not only an able and hardworking man but also a man of high order of intelligence. He was thoroughly conversant on current events and a respected political leader of the Progressive Conservative Party in his district. In his dealings with men his honesty, his integrity and his ability to always see the good in every body won and held for him enduring friendships.

The deceased was the son of Anson Chisholm and Elizabeth Carleton and was born in St. John's, Newfoundland, many years ago. He was predeceased by a brother Michael who lost his life in the first world war. He leaves to mourn their loss two sisters Mary of Waban, Mass., and Margaret of St. John's, N.S. (McMillan) of Vernon River.

Comforted in body by all that had entered the nearby cemetery, and in soul by the daily reception of the Sacraments, none realized more fully than himself that the end was drawing near. And so in the past few days as the Angel of Death hovered near he turned his thoughts to comforting those whom he feared might be disposed to mourn. Fortified with this calm strength of unflinching faith he bore up to the end. In the early hours of Wednesday, January 26th, 1944, Joseph A. Chisholm, admired, respected and loved by all, passed to his Eternal Rest.

His remains were kept at the home of his sister, Mrs. Ernest McMillan until Friday, January 28th, 1944 and then were brought to St. Joseph's Church where High Mass of Requiem was sung by the Rt. Rev. Maurice McDonald, P.M., Rev. K. MacPherson was in the sanctuary.

Following the Mass the casket was conveyed to the nearby cemetery, the funeral procession being perhaps the largest ever witnessed by the residents of the district. The pall bearers were: Joseph McIsaac, J. J. McInnis, M. F. McLeod, E. E. McLeod, C. McLeod, W. E. McKinnon. With all the solemn ritual of the church that he loved and served so well, the remains were quietly laid away in the family plot, to await the promised day when they shall rise again, to share with the soul in Bliss Eternal.

Warns Public Against Unsound Mining Stock

TORONTO, Jan. 24. (CP) — Toronto Stock Exchange, in a brief to the Ontario Mining Commission meeting here today, expressed "alarm" with the current campaign for sale of promotional mining stock, "proceeds of which, in whole or in part, ostensibly go to the financing of mine developments."

He said he believed that unless measures are taken to protect the public against itself a "veritable hoem" will develop in unseasoned and in many instances, unsound securities.
