DEATH OF MRS. RACHEL KINCH—Friends will regret to learn of the death on Saturday morning of Mrs. Rachel Kinch, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Inman of Alberton. Mrs. Kinch was 89 years of age and until a short while ago resided at Alberton. She was the widow of the late Albert Kinch, the first diver to reside at Alberton. Her maiden name was Rachel McAliff. She lived all her life in Alberton and was most highly esteemed for her many good qualities and hospitable nature. A short while ago she returned to Alberton from a visit to Medford, Mass., her daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Farrell accompanying her. She had the misfortune to fall and fracture her hip; from the effects of the fall her last illness is attributed. There were left to mourn besides the two daughters mentioned, who were at her bedside when she died, another daughter, Mrs. Cobb, of Gloucester, Mass., and three sons, Michael of Alberton, Albert of Medford, Mass., and George of New York, to all of whom sympathy is extended. Friends throughout the Province will hear with regret of the death of Rev. Donald MacLean, who passed away in this city on Saturday at the age of 88 years. A native of Belfast, Prince Edward Island, the late Mr. MacLean was for many years a successful school teacher, and will be affectionately remembered by his pupils in many places on the Island, including Belfast, Valleyfield, Alexandria and Stanley Bridge. Among his pupils were Rev. M.M. McLeod, New York; Mr. K. J. Martin, C. C. City; Rev. J. M. MacLeod, City and the late Mr. John P. MacLeod, formerly Deputy Attorney-General for British Columbia.

Rev. Mr. MacLean studied theology in the Presbyterian College, Montreal. After graduation, he was called to Eartown, Nova Scotia, and after a pastorate of several years in that Province, was called to the Presbyterian congregation of West Cape, Prince Edward Island. About twenty years ago he retired from the active service of the Ministry, and came to live in Charlottetown. He was chaplain to the Prince Edward Island Hospital for several years, and many patients will remember with gratitude his services. About thirty years ago he published a volume of poems and hymns, which were permeated with deep religious sentiment. Since that time he has published several works in verse and has been a valued contributor to The Guardian both in verse and prose on many occasions.

The late Mr. MacLean's wife, who was a Miss Edwards of Montreal, predeceased him by several years. There survives of the union two sons, David E., vice principal of the Westmount High School, and is a distinguished graduate of both Dalhousie University and John, a teacher in Craigmyl, Alta. The former is expected to arrive in the city this evening to attend the funeral which will take place from St. James Presbyterian Church on Tuesday at 10 o'clock to the West Cape Cemetery, Hamilton Road, Lot 8.

On August 16th last the spirit of Mrs. Prudence Mugford took its flight to the "Realms of Bliss" and on the 18th her body was laid away in the People's Cemetery beside those of her late husband and daughter. About one year ago she was smitten with tuberculosis and was admitted to the Provincial Sanatorium, where despite all that love and skill could do, she passed away at the comparatively early age of fifty-four years.

Mrs. Mugford (nee Prudence Waye) was born and brought up in Hunter River, the abode still of four brothers and two sisters, and came to Charlottetown to live when she was married to the late George Mugford, a well known salesman in the city. Here two children were born to them, Edna, at present of DeBols Bros., and Minnie, who died ten years ago.

To all sorrowing friends, and especially to Miss Edna, now so much alone, this paper joins with all sympathizers in expressions of sincere goodwill.

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Sunday, August 20th, of Miss Eva E. Stamper, one of our best known and beloved residents. She was a daughter of the late Daniel Stamper and was born in Economy, N. S. When a young child she came to Charlottetown and lived with her uncle, the late Henry Stamper. He carried on a book and stationery business in what came to be known as the Stamper Block, at the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets, part of the property being now occupied by Proxse Bros. Limited. After his death the estate passed to his two nieces, Miss Sarah, who passed away nine years ago, and Miss Eva E. Stamper.

The latter was a life-long member of the First Methodist, now Trinity United Church. She possessed deep religious convictions and sought to pattern her life after that of the great Master whom she so devoutly served. She was a generous supporter of all branches of the church work, of the Missionary and Dorcas Societies and other organizations. To all worthy causes, to the hospital and the orphanage, she always gave freely. The poor, the needy and the afflicted had always her heartfelt sympathy and financial aid, and by her death have lost a great friend.

Early in August she had the misfortune of falling and breaking her two wrists and never recovered from the effects of the injury, gradually becoming weaker until her gentle spirit took its flight.

All her sisters predeceased her, and she leaves to fondly cherish her memory three nieces, Mrs. Hattie Lamond, Attleboro, Mass.; Mrs. Eva Nelson, Lower Wintworth, N. S.; Mrs. Norma Fonger, Attleboro, Mass., and a wide circle of friends.

She was laid to rest in Sherwood Cemetery on Tuesday last, beside her sister, Sarah J. Stamper, who predeceased her nine years ago.

Services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. Dr. Ramsay, and Rev. H. D. Raymond. The pall bearers were A. C. Duchemin, E. T. Higgs, T. W. L. Prouse, Simon Paoli, J. P. Gordon and S. A. MacLeod.

RECEIVES CONGRATULATIONS—Mr. E. A. Foster received many congratulations yesterday on the honour conferred upon him at the annual meeting of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association in Montreal. As reported in yesterday's Guardian, Mr. Foster, though not present at the convention, was elected an Honorary President. For over twenty years Mr. Foster has been an executive member of the Association. He was President in 1927, and in 1928, as Vice-President had much to do with bringing the annual convention to Charlottetown. His present appointment as an Honorary President is therefore a well earned distinction.

George MacLeod, aged 40 years, a native of Panmure Island died suddenly at Bridgeport in the town of Glouce Bay, O.E. on August 21. He went to Cape Breton twenty years ago and worked in the mines. For some years he was foreman at the banking station at Dominion No. 2 mine. He served three years in the Great War where he was shell-shocked and gassed, which may have hastened his end. He was twice married, and is survived by his wife, nee Jennie Collins, of Baddeck, C.B., and five children. The funeral was on Aug. 24 from Chalmers United Church, Dominion No. 1, service conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. A. McLellan, and burial was in Ocean Avenue Cemetery.

Mr. John Edwin Bell, one of Charlottetown's most successful and most highly respected business men, member of the firm of Buntain, Bell and Co., passed away at his home yesterday forenoon. He had been in failing health for the past two or three years. Last June his illness took a more serious turn and since then he gradually grew weaker until the end came.

He was the son of the late John Bell, of this city. When a youth he entered the employ of Peake Bros., steamship agents, ship builders and coal dealers. He eventually became sales agent for coal for that firm, the late Mr. H. V. Buntain being book keeper.

He was twice married, first to the late Miss Nellie Crab, and again to Miss Blanche MacLeod. He leaves to mourn besides his widow, and one daughter, by his first marriage, Nellie, wife of Stewart Beal, of Montreal. She has been in Charlottetown for the past few weeks.
