AN INTERESTING BIT OF ANCIENT HISTORY

The following history of the early years of this Province has been furnished The Guardian by A. K. Henry of Granville. The article was written by his father, the late Edward Henry and was found among his papers after his death some nineteen years ago. It will be found most interesting as many of the names mentioned therein are well known to the present generation.

January 24, 1887, Granville Mills, Lot 21.
The following is an account of my ancestors on both mother and father's side. As near as I can recollect my grandfather Henry came to this Island from Kentyre, Scotland, and was among the first that settled in Malpeque, his farm being on the east side of King Street run or brook. His name was Donald and his wife's name was Mary McMullen. He had in family three sons and six daughters. My mother's father came to this Island in the Polly and settled in Malpeque close by Neil Taylor's Pond. His name was McQuillan and his wife's name was Isabel Russell. They came from Elgin. In family he had two sons and five daughters. My grandmother had a brother who taught school in this Province in the 17th century. Some of his pupils are still living, viz: Hon. W. W. Lord, D. M. Hooper of Charlottetown. His name was Charles Russell. My father's name was Alexander and my mother's name Isabel. They settled and lived on a farm on the southwest branch of Darnley River and there lived and died. The farm is held and enjoyed by my two maiden sisters. My father's family consisted of three sons and five daughters and their names were Charles, Edward, Douglas and Isabel, Mary Barbara, Katherine and Flora. My father died on the 5th of September, 1868, aged 89 years. My mother died the 8th of April, 1869, aged 89 years.

Man has peculiar fondness for dwelling on past events and he is rarely ever tired of narrating those past events that in any way connected with the history of his own life.

The author and writer of this imperfect collection, Edward Henry, was born in Malpeque on March 10th, 1814, attended school in a school near the present church. That school district comprised Oyster Cove, Beachpoint, Darnley—down as far as William Donaldson's and all Malpeque.

Our teachers were James Gillendar and Charles Fowler. Tuition fee was one pound for three months and and cut your own firewood. The first Sunday School was started in Malpeque I think in 1827. The teachers were Miss Mary Stewart and Benj. Bearisto (elder). On May 13th, 1834, I was apprenticed in Charlottetown to Charles Chipman Davison for five years to learn the blacksmith trade. My yearly fee was five pounds and my own wearing apparel. The leading merchants in Charlottetown 50 years ago were James Beaudin, H. and F. Longworth, Dennis Reddin, John McGill, David Wilson, Nathan Davis, Daniel Brennan, James Purdy, Samuel Nelson, Andrew and James Duncan, Patrick Walker, and Donald Beaton. The Chief Justice was Edward Jarvis. John C. Sims was High Sheriff for the whole Province. Thomas H. Haviland, Colonial Secretary and Sir Robert Hodgson was Attorney General. There was Tory rule in those days, and this was twenty years before we obtained responsible Government. Our market for produce, which consisted of potatoes and oats, was Miramichi and Halifax. Our first exportation of horses was to Miramichi. Lumbering and shipbuilding was their principal trade at that time. Gilmore and Rankin and Samuel Gaard were the two principal firms. I might just mention in connection with the hard times of those days that in the latter part of August, 1836, a severe frost swept over the whole Province and destroyed all the grain crops. On account of the scarcity that year I have seen barley meal sell in the market at Charlottetown for six pence per pound. There were no importations of flour at that time. In May, 1839, when my term of apprenticeship expired, I worked for James and Alexander Simpson of Cavendish for a period of one year. They were shipbuilding for Canada. From there I removed to Malpeque and lived on a farm now owned by William Simpson. In November, 1853, I removed to Summerside and purchased 70 acres of land from Joseph Green. In May, 1858, I removed to Wilmot Creek, the land now owned by William Hacker. In October, 1860, I purchased the Granville Mills with 150 acres of land where I am now living.

I married on February 28th, 1843, Mrs. Henry's name was Grace Hacker, a native of Devonshire, England, who came to this Island with her parents in 1841. Mr. Hacker, William, her father, died 8th of January, 1851. Her mother died 18th of August, 1858. Both were buried at Springfield Church, Lot 67. Our family consisted of eight children, four sons and four daughters, Augustus, John, Charles and Edward; Isabella, Leah, Flora and Emma. Four only title. All new countries are more or less the scene of privations and hardships and F. E. I. was not exempt. But the severest trials the people endured in the early history of the Island was the unjust, tyrannical treatment received from men claiming to be the owners of land. Some of them took from the poor people thousands of pounds and future events proved that they had not the least shadow of a who were laboring under hardships similar to those endured at present by the people of Ireland. If any one felt aggrieved by reason of landlordism he had no chance of going into court for this reason—All our crown officers from the governor down to the attorney general, held their appointments from the crown. England sympathized with the proprietors and the lawyers were led by the latter. But in the year 1841 a man was found in the person of the late George Cole, who espoused the cause of the poor tenants. He was elected to parliament and commenced to pull down the citadel of Toryism. Such was the displeasure felt by the Tory party that they put him into prison, while parliament was still in session, because he would not say they were honest men.

He stood by the people, fought for their rights as no man has done before or since. His first acts were for Education and Universal Suffrage. He obtained Responsible Government in 1850. Some of his colleagues for liberty were Edward Whelan (printer), James Warburton, W. Lord, Francis Kelly, Benj. Davis, W. S. McNeil and Alex. Rae. By and through his efforts all the lands were bought by the Government and resold to the holders of the soil so that now peace reigns through our land and every man sits on his own soil and no landlord can make him afraid.

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ONTARIO ELECTIONS, WHITNEY'S MAJORITY 58.
TORONTO, Dec. 12.—The Ontario provincial elections yesterday resulted very much as expected, in the return of the administration of Sir James Whitney with a slightly reduced, but still preponderating majority.

The standing of the parties which in the last House was 87 Conservatives, 18 Liberals, and one Independent, will in next Legislature be 82 Conservatives, 23 Liberals, and one Independent, giving Sir James a safe majority of 58 over his Liberal and Independent opponents, in a total of 106 seats, as compared with his majority of sixty-six in the last House.

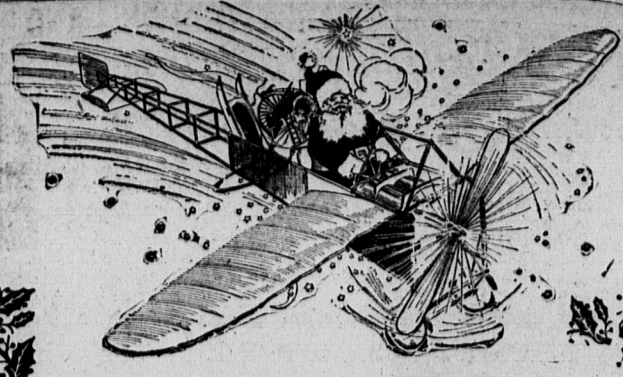
