105th BOY DECORATED.—Word has just been received that another brave Islander, Pte. Henry W. McLean, Lower Bedouque, son of Mrs. Charles Gallant has been awarded the Military Medal for conspicuous bravery in action at Hill 90 in August last. At this time Pte. McLean was badly wounded by shrapnel in the thigh, as a result of which he is now in Berlington War Hospital, Shrewsbury, England, where he has undergone two unsuccessful operations, but soon will undergo a third with what is expected better results. This gallant boy was a member of the 105th Battalion. At the time the regiment was broken up he was transferred to the 13th Reserve Battalion and from there to the New Brunswick famous "Fighting 26th" where he won his well-merited decoration. He is the second 105th boy to receive a decoration for bravery in the field.

THE SANTA MARIA.—The Santa Maria which was sold at Auction to satisfy a legal claim was purchased with all her contents by Dr. Leo Frank for \$800. This unique ship has a romantic story. She was built by the Spanish government and presented to the City of Chicago to commemorate Spain's part in the discovery of America, on the occasion of the 400th anniversary of the arrival of Christopher Columbus. After the Exposition at Chicago the ship was loaned to a syndicate for exhibition purposes and was used in this connection for several years, during which about half a million dollars was taken in admission fees. Through some reason unknown legal complications arose and the ship was sold by the Admiralty Court to meet a claim of \$940.40 plus costs which was awarded to the Neville Canner's Limited of Halifax for towage. The ship contains Columbus relics of priceless value which the Spanish government would probably never have parted with had they suspected that their present to an American City would be sold under the auctioneer's hammer to meet a towage claim. Dr. Leo Frank is now in a position to dictate terms to the City of Chicago as to whether he or the Windy City shall be the possessor of the gift of the Spanish government.

HILL 70 VETERANS.—In the last issue of the Montreal Standard appears a photo of the gallant Canadian lads who survived the sanguinary assault on Hill 70, passing in review before General Horne, two days after the great victory. Among the number is a machine gun officer, of Charlottetown.

PRODUCE MARKET.—There was only a fair offering before the local exporters yesterday. Potatoes sold for 85c a bushel, oats brought 70c, hay sold for \$13 a ton and turnips, per 50 lbs. brought from 12c to 15c. From private wires received the American potato market is easing up in its demands, which will probably mean a reduction in price on the local market.
