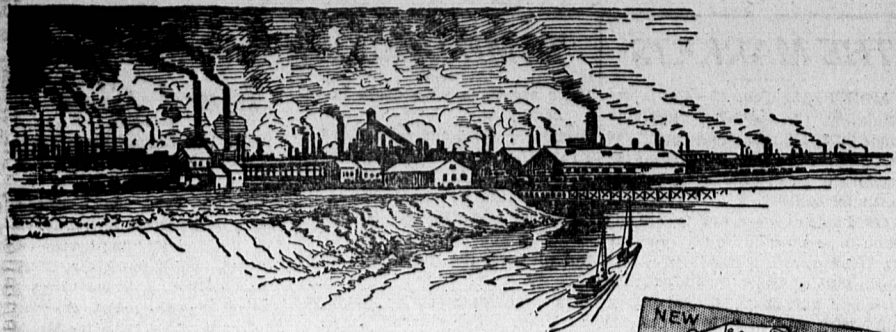

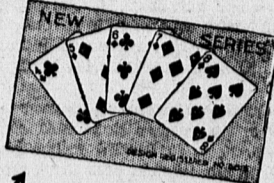

NEWS DELAYED

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—The burning out of a cable in a street manhole delayed for several hours today the feeding of news from the New York Bureau of the Canadian Press and the Associated Press to hundreds of newspapers in eastern Canada and the eastern and central States.

The cable runs from Associated Press headquarters near Grand Central terminal to the Western Union buildings in Walker Street, more than two miles downtown, where the 350 wires of the cable are directed throughout the country. Melting snow presumably flooded a manhole, causing a grounding or short-circuit of the cable.

Proposals Should Make For Better Relations

(Special to the Guardian) TORQUAY, Devonshire, Feb. 23.—Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign sec'y, said in a speech here last night that he is convinced that it is within the power of the British govt. to submit proposals to the United States which will be acceptable to the entire world. While Sir Austen did not specify the proposals to which he referred, it was assumed

that he meant, in addition to naval proposals, all outstanding problems in connection with Anglo-American relations. "These proposals should place our friendship on a footing which is not only our desire and interest but which interests the world at large," the minister said. Sir Austen said that the government would be, in his belief, in such a position as soon as Britain's considerations and examinations of its survey of Anglo-American relations had been concluded. The government has been engaged for some months in a careful survey of all issues which have arisen in these discussions affecting the future of our relations," the foreign sec'y said.

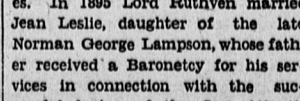
APPOINTED GOVERNOR

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Major General Lord Ruthven, C.B., C.M.G., has been appointed Governor of Jersey, and will assume office early in the summer.

Lord Ruthven has had a brilliant career. He is 58 years old and was educated at Eton. He served in the South African war. In the Great War he was wounded, and was mentioned in despatches seven times. In 1895 Lord Ruthven married Jean Leslie, daughter of the late Norman George Lamson, whose father received a Baronetcy for his services in connection with the successful laying of the first Atlantic telegraph cable. Lady Ruthven is a sister of Sir Miles Wedderburn Lamson, British Minister to China. Lord Ruthven has four daughters, of whom the eldest, Countess of Carlisle, is heir to his Scottish Barony. The heir to his British Barony is his brother, the Hon. Sir Alexander Hore-Ruthven, V. C., etc., Governor of South Australia. Sir Alexander has one son.
