## DARTMOUTH, N.S., Sept. 20

(CP)—Ed Pontes, a 27-year-old righthander from East Boston, arrived by plane just in time to spin a neat four-hitter as Sydney Mines Ramblers upset Dartmouth Arrows 3-2 before 1,680 fans in the opening game of the Nova Scotia senior baseball finals here today. Second game of the best-of-five series is scheduled for Dartmouth tomorrow. Then the teams shift to Cape Breton for the remainder of the round with the third game slated for Sydney Mines Friday. Winner will meet Fredericton Capitals, New Brunswick champions, at the Maritime title if arrangements can be made.

Pontes left Ramblers about six weeks ago when it appeared the team would fold because of financial difficulties. He was persuaded to return when Ramblers, who finished third during the season, captured their first Colliery League crown in 20 years. They knocked off Whitney Pier Pirates, defending titlists, and schedule-winning Glace Bay Miners in Cinderella fashion.

But for the fourth inning, when Arrows scored all their runs, Pontes had little trouble with the Halifax District League kings who went into the game as 7-5 favorites. He fanned seven and walked two with an awkward but effective delivery while his mates played errorless ball behind him.

Ramblers were never headed after they jumped Johnny Duarte for two unearned runs in the first inning. They added what proved to be the winner in the top of the fourth by cashing in on the breaks.

Duarte spaced seven hits but his control was off in the first few innings. He completely humiliated Ramblers for the last five innings and went on to whiff 10 while walking three. Two of the walks set up scoring plays.

After Thompson turned back the league leading Cards 4-3, Sawyer took occasion to direct a few choice remarks at the second-place Dodgers.

"I hope Jocko's work convinced the Brooklyn loud mouths that we are not bringing up 'patsys' from the minors nor do we have any 'patsys' on our ball club.

"We're playing every game to win just as if we were fighting for their own club. I'll run mine."

The skipper of the third-place Phillies referred to the three-game sweep his club enjoyed at the expense of the Dodgers last month at Ebbets Field. Those tickings started the then league-leading Dodgers on a tailspin that eventually cost them the top spot to the Cards.

## Baseball's Big Six

(Canadian Press) The pennant-hungry St. Louis Cardinals Tuesday won an important game from Philadelphia Phillies, 7-5, but it may prove to be a costly one in their National League rivalry with the tenacious Brooklyn Dodgers.

Stan Musial, the most important member of their cast, hammered a single and triple for the Cards, but in the process lost his three-base hit to the Dodger's mighty slugger, Yogi Berra, who in his left leg, was expected to lead the Dodgers tomorrow.

A club spokesman announced the injury was not serious, and Musial is expected to play against the Dodgers tomorrow.

The triumph enabled the Cards to maintain their first-place advantage of a game and a half over the Brooklyn Dodgers, who blanked the Cubs in Chicago, 5-0. St. Louis, ahead by two games in the "lost" column, has 10 games left to play against Brooklyn's nine.

The game itself was a loosely-played affair, five errors being committed. The Cards made three runs, but they rapped 14 hits off three Philly fingers to enable Fred Martin to register his sixth triumph of the season without a setback.

Jack Banta, a lean right-hander, meanwhile won the most important game of his brief career as he pitched the Dodgers to a 5-0 win over Johnny Schemitz and the Cubs.

Banta's side-arm fast ball and sinker had the Cubs in complete submission. The lanky youth granted only five hits, fanned five and walked nine in besting Schemitz who had scored four of Chicago's five triumphs over the Dodgers this year.

Both Banta and Schemitz were locked in a scoreless duel until two were out in the Dodger sixth. Schemitz then lost his control and the Dodgers poured three runs home to wrap up the decision.

(By The Canadian Press) New York Yankees gleefully took three hits off lefty Bob Kuzava Tuesday but that was all the hustling American League leaders required to beat Chicago White Sox 3-1.

The victory safeguarded the Yankees' healthy three-game lead over the second-place Boston Red Sox, who eliminated the defending world champion Cleveland Indians from contention with a 5-2 triumph.

Kuzava's wildness proved his downfall. Kuzava fanned 10, and two of the three tickets resulted in runs.

The Yanks clipped Kuzava for two runs in the second inning on one hit. They scored their final run in the seventh on three walks and Phil Rizzuto's bunt single. Although they failed to gain ground on the pace-setting Yankees, runner-up Red Sox eliminated Cleveland from the pennant race.

Mel Parnell, stylish Boston left-hander, pitched and helped beat himself to his 24th victory.

He thus became the "winningest" Sox southpaw since the pitching days of the late Babe Ruth, who won 23 for the Sox more than 30 years ago.

The Sox were hitless and runless against Bob Lemon, Cleveland's 20-game winner, until the sixth, when Parnell led off Boston's turn at bat with a sharp line single to right.

That began it.

Before the inning ended the Sox had scored all their runs and driven out Lemon, who suffered his 10th loss.

In Philadelphia, Pete Suders' 11th home run of the year, hit in the eighth inning with two mates on base, gave the Athletics an 8-8 triumph over Detroit Tigers.

The blow off relief pitcher Freddie Hutchinson wiped out a one-run edge the Tigers had built up against Lou Bristle in the top half of the eighth stanza.

Bristle, who relieved starter Carl Scheib with none out and the bases loaded in the seventh, received credit for his 16th pitching triumph.

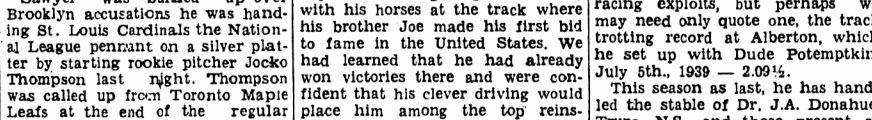
