Hon. M. C. Delaney, M.P., Government Whip, North Tryon, and Mr. W. E. Dawson, Boston, came to the city yesterday to meet Mr. W. H. Norton and Mr. Charles W. Toothaker of Boston who arrived by the Boston boat last evening in the interest of the North Tryon Silver Black Fox Company, Ltd., of which Mr. Delaney is President and the other gentlemen mentioned are directors. This Fox Company is capitalized at \$100,000.00 and have now under construction one of the finest ranches in the Province.

Mr. F. P. Gutelius, the General Manager of the I. C. R., who accompanied the Minister of Railways and Canals on his recent visit of inspection to the Island last week, intends taking up his residence at Moncton, New Brunswick, and proposes removing there next month from Montreal, where he has been living for the past two years. Mr. Gutelius was very much impressed with the attractions of the Island as the result of his visit and he hopes to bring his family here for a fortnight at least this summer, during which period he will make the Island his headquarters.

IMPUDENT THEFT.—A barefaced robbery is reported to have been committed on Sunday at the shop in Kingston of Mr. Green. It appears that in the course of the day two young men, who turn out to be of the city, called at the place, and one of them entered the front door of the building in which Mr. Green lived and the shop is also carried out, made the pretext of being in search of cigars. Of course these were not procurable at the shop and the young man and his companion left. Sometime after their departure Mr. Green discovered that the sum of \$16 which was in the cash till of the shop, had disappeared. He communicated with the police, and Detective Sgt. Bradley, who investigated the matter, succeeded in tracing the supposed thieves. It is understood that the young fellows confessed their guilt but refunded the money and Mr. Green content with the restitution of his property, has not pressed for their prosecution.

Mr. John A. McLean, son of N. K. McLean of Mitchell River, carpenter on S. S. Minto, has just returned to the Island after an absence of seven years in the West. Mr. McLean, who is a carpenter by trade, in the employment of the C. P. R., has been over the greater part of the Western Provinces—including Calgary, Edmonton, Athabaska Landing, Prince Rupert and Vancouver. He reports that trade is very bad out West at present, and intimates that about 50 per cent of the building trade are out of employment. In the money market, the municipalities finding it very hard to raise money for extension and development purposes. The crops, particularly in Alberta, are not up to expectation, and if the drought does not give way soon, the harvest will be one of the shortest for many years. Mr. McLean is delighted with the prosperous appearance of Prince Edward Island, which looks more go-ahead and comfortable than any part he has touched on his way home. He hopes to spend a couple of months here and return to his situation West.

Robert Laird Borden, Premier of Canada, was born fifty-nine years ago today in the little Nova Scotian village of Grand Pre, immortalized as the opening scene of Longfellow's "Evangeline." He was educated at Acadia Villa Academy at Horton, near his birthplace. At the age of nineteen he left Nova Scotia to become a teacher in the Glenwood Institute, in New Jersey. In the following year he began the study of law, and was called to the bar in 1878, at the age of twenty-four. He built up an extensive practice in Nova Scotia, and engaged in many important cases before the Provincial and Dominion Supreme Courts and the judicial committee of the Privy Council. He was made Queen's Counsel in 1891, president of the Nova Scotia Bar, Society in 1893, honorary Doctor of Civil Law by Queens University in 1903, and since then many honors have been conferred upon him. He began his public career as member for the city and county of Halifax in 1896, and soon became a prominent figure in the House of Commons. Upon the resignation of Sir Charles Tupper in February, 1901, he was elected leader of the Conservative party. He became Premier and President of the Privy Council in 1911, as a result of the Conservative victory in the election of Sept. 21, 1911. Premier Borden's principal recreations are cricket, golf and tennis. Before becoming Prime Minister he was defeated in a memorable golf match with President Taft at Augusta, Ga., and it is rumored that he has been improving his game with the intention of seeking revenge when the former President of the United States visits Canada this summer. The Premier married Laura, youngest daughter of the late Mr. T. H. Bond of Halifax in 1889.

As head of the diocese he bade Father Johnston farewell and wished him God speed. He would do as well in his new field of labor as those who had gone before him to labor in the Canadian west. Rev. Dr. G. J. McLellan, Mr. D. O'M. Reddin, Messrs Landrian, James McIsaac Alexander McDonald, also spoke referring in complimentary terms to Father Johnston and wishing him God speed.

A pleasing feature of the program was a vocal solo by Miss Lucy Blanchard the words of the song having been written by Father Johnston. Mr. W. J. Brown also contributed a delightful solo and some enjoyable selections were rendered by the excellent Society's band.
