Manitoba Election Slated For Oct. 15

WINNIPEG, Sept. 10 — (CP)—The Manitoba coalition government under the leadership of Premier Stuart S. Garson will seek a new mandate from the

electorate at a general provincial election Oct. 15. Nominating day will be Oct. 5.

Premier Garson announced the election is date following prorogation of a five-day special session of the 21st Legislature called to deal with post-war rehabilitation and reconstruction plans.

An order-in-council dissolving the fifth session of the 21st Legislature was signed by Lieutenant-Governor R. P. McWilliams, who later signed the writs for the election.

The coalition government was formed in 1940 by James Bracken, then Premier, and now national leader of the Progressive Conservative party, Mr. Garson, who had headed the Manitoba Liberal Progressive, took office as Premier Jan. 14, 1943, following the resignation of Mr. Bracken.

The last provincial election was April 22, 1941, when 50 government supporters were returned to the 55-member house. At dissolution the standing was: Government-Coalition 43, including Liberals and Progressives, Social Credit and Independents; anti-coalition Opposition 9, including C. P., Independent-Conservatives, Labor Progressive and Independents. There are three vacancies.

cannot drop on the floor and become soiled. If the baby is bottle-fed, care must be taken that the nipples and bottles are washed and boiled between feedings.

Many doctors order vegetables and fruits for the baby about the time he is four to five months old. They should be cooked and pureed through a sieve, because he can neither chew nor digest the coarser parts.

The only raw foods that the baby under one year of age should have are mashed ripe bananas or apples scraped ripe apples. A banana is ripe when the skin is yellow and has small brown spots on it.

Raw well-ripened peaches, pears and grapes can be given the child at 18 months if peeled and mashed. Large chunks of any kind of food are not properly digested and may cause a bowel disturbance.

Arrest Sadistic Jap Internment Camp Official

HOWLON, Okinawa, Sept. 10 — (CP Cable)—A Canadian-born Japanese, known as Inouye, a native of Kamloops, B. C., and de-ported by Canadian Hong Kong prisoners as the most sadistic of all camp officials, has been captured.

Inouye, an interpreter at the Samsulpo Camp here where Canadians were confined following Hong Kong's surrender Christmas Day, 1941, was picked up yesterday after disappearing several weeks ago when Japan's surrender was imminent.

Inouye's prisoners' stories of cruelties and indignities at the camp came around to the same subject—Inouye. The Japanese, whose parents still live in Kamloops, used to boast his father served as a corporal in the Canadian Army in the First Great War and won a decoration.

Inouye went to school in Kamloops and lived there until he was 24, from all evidence acting as an agent for the Japanese espionage system. He went to Japan in 1936 and came to Samsulpo as interpreter on arrival of the Canadians.

"If we fell for the ruse, he would take us outside and beat us," the officer said.

Mrs. H. S. Henderson, stressed the point that if the Orphanage is to continue at its present high level the response to the appeal this fall must be a most generous one.

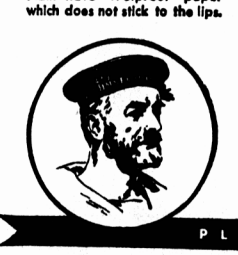

Predicts Income Tax Reduction

TORONTO, Sept. 11 — (CP)—The Toronto Star in a special dispatch from Ottawa, predicted today that income tax reductions amounting to at least seven per cent of taxable income are likely to be announced in the budget to be presented to the present session of Parliament.

The seven per cent reductions, the Star said, would be achieved by abolition of the "normal" income tax and merging it with the total income tax to achieve its full elimination.

But probably your own opinion on the subject will change when you marry and have children, for babies' hands work miracles in altering women's ideas on this subject.

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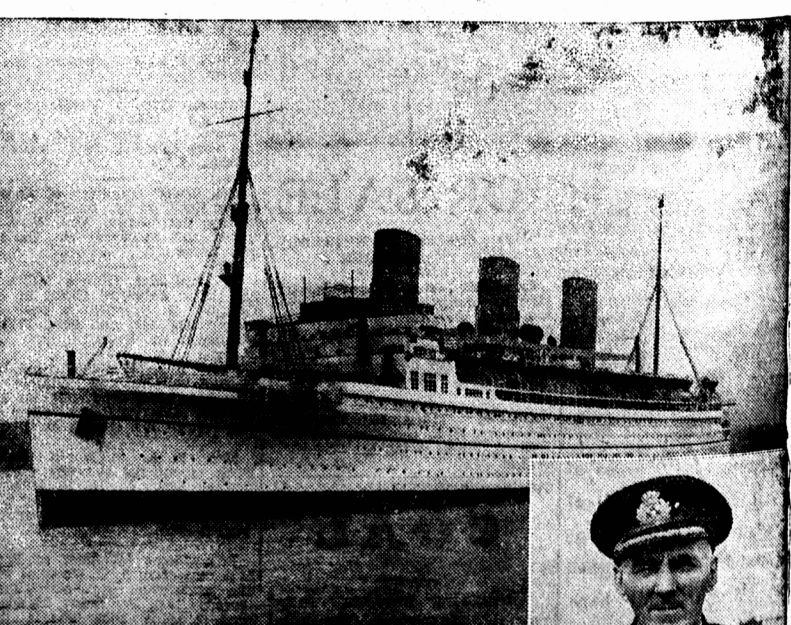
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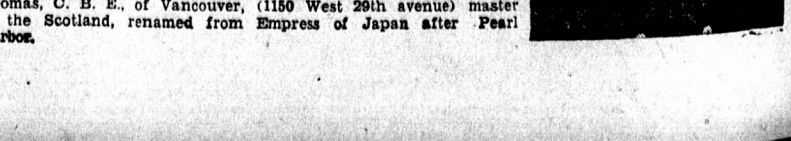
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'LEAVE SHIP' FOR ATHLONES
