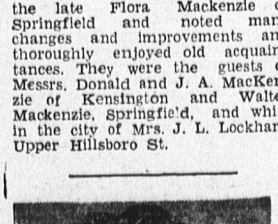

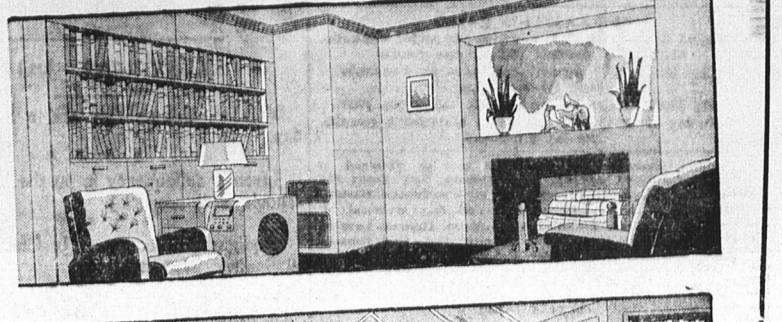

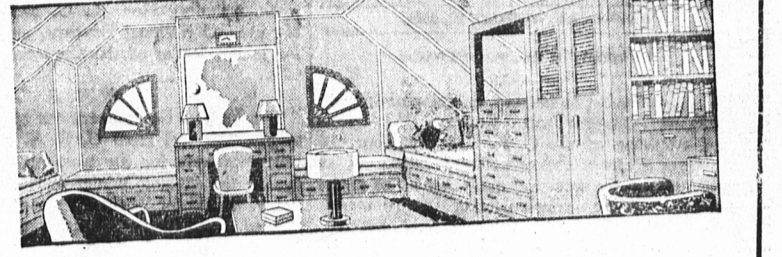

RESTORING WAXED SURFACES

A waxed surface which has been scratched or spotted may be cleaned by washing it with turpentine, and then re-waxing. If the wood is dark, the wax should be colored with a little jet of ivory black, as to leave a light film on the furniture. A varnished surface which has turned white from water or hot dishes may usually be restored by rubbing it lightly with a piece of flannel dampened with spirits of camphor, essence of peppermint, or an inferior quality of varnish. An inferior quality of varnish. An inferior rub sometimes helps to improve the appearance. If not, the piece
