THE P. E. I. Bible Society's Good Work

The P. E. I. Auxiliary to the Canadian Bible Society has achieved some little leadership in the program of the parent organization through its experimental effort in the Young People's Work. With this year it begins the fifth season of its department of Scripture Memory Work. This piece of work which is exactly what its name indicates is an effort to do service to the rising generation by storing their minds with the gems of Sacred Scripture. The Society has sought to stimulate this interest by the offering of awards of whole Scripture or portions for the memorization of selected passages in accordance with a defined plan. In the last four years a great many children have responded to the opportunity and received the awards.

With this year the Bible Society has extended its field of operation to other Provinces and already there is a hearty response. A particularly pleasing feature of the growth of the work has been expressed desire on the part of denominational workers to co-ordinate every such program of work in use in this Dominion and to undertake as worthily an effort every possible ally. Happily this desire seems likely of accomplishment. At the recent annual meeting of the Canadian Bible Society held in London, Ont., the members there assembled heartily endorsed the plan of Scripture Memory Work and appointed its representatives to confer with the Religious Education Council of Canada for the purpose of furthering this objective. At a subsequent meeting of representatives there was found the utmost readiness for co-operation and plans are already under way for providing one common program of Scripture Memory Work through which these two great organizations will use every effort to implant the Bible as the great need of modern education.

While such development is in preparation the P. E. I. Bible Society continue its work for the children of this Province. Copies

THE MARKETS
 MONTREAL, May 27.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain here today was fair, but as the price bid in most cases were little over the export price, the market in this respect was quiet, but there was some enquiry from exporters for wheat and barley to fill ocean freight engagements, and sales of several loads of No. 1 and No. 3 northern wheat and some No. 2 were made here at f.o.b. prices Montreal. There was no change in the condition of the domestic market for oats. The demand from local and country buyers for supplies being still limited on account of the fact that hand to meet their requirements for the time being and the volume of business was small. Prices for all grades of spring wheat flour were well maintained at the recent advances established, but there was no improvement in the volume of business in any direction owing to the fact that both domestic and foreign buyers were not disposed to respond to the higher prices, and in consequence the market was quiet the trade in winter wheat flour was also of a limited character, on account of the higher prices asked and the fact that buyers in most cases seem to be fairly well supplied for the time being, but as the offerings from Ontario millers were small values were sustained. A firm feeling prevailed in the market for all kinds of millfeed. On account of the continued small offerings and the steady demand from local and country buyers, while the undertone to the standard rolled oats market was firm the trade volume was small. The volume of business transacted in eggs was moderate and prices were unchanged. Liable trade was done in butter, but the tendency was steady a fairly active trade was transacted in cheese and prices showed no change.
