Stocks Lead Sluggish Trend In New York

(By FREDERICK GARDNER Associated Press Financial Writer)

NEW YORK, June 19—(AP)—With copper showing the way, leading stocks edged forward Saturday in the slowest market session for nearly 20 years.

The list started off slightly higher and then shifted over a narrow range during the remainder of the proceeding. There was an assortment of negligible losers at the close with a few weak spots in evidence.

Strength marked the Canadian list with Canadian Car ahead one and Dome International Nickel, Ford, Imperial Oil, Imperial Tobacco and Shawinigan up fractions. Distillers-Sagegrains, McIntyre, Walkers, Brazilian and Lake Shore were softer.

Major Steels managed to emerge a trifle higher, although they were sluggish the greater part of the time on forecasts further cuts in quotations for steel products were likely. A lift in the steel scrap price of 50 cents a ton at Pittsburgh was a sustaining influence.

Most gold mines lost their buoyancy of the early part of the week as dollar devaluation talk waned.

Commodities generally provided the brightest market picture of the week, most finishing well ahead.

Quiet Trading On Montreal Stock Market

MONTREAL, June 19—(CP)—Trading was quiet on the stock market Saturday but most issues tended to rise narrowly moving up 1-2 at 28-1-2. Canadian Car and Foundry Preferred reached a new high mark for the year.

Following the general trend metals moved up slowly. With the exception of Canadian Car and Foundry Preferred, rails held firm. Canadian Pacific held steady with the previous close.

In the papers, St. Lawrence Paper preferred was unchanged. Constructions were unsteady.

The general list was a bit stronger. Canada Steamship Lines preferred and general steel wares sold up fractionally.

Currencies

MONTREAL, June 19—(CP)—The Pound Sterling declined one cent at 85.00 27-32 on Montreal foreign exchange markets Saturday, while the French franc held about even at 2.80 31-32 cents. The United States dollar declined 13-64 per cent at 3-4 per cent premium.

NEW YORK, June 19—(AP)—Major European currencies moved into a quiet and narrow range in foreign exchange dealings Saturday after a week of erratic fluctuations in terms of the United States dollar.

Ending unchanged were the Pound Sterling at 4.97 1-8, the French franc at 2.87 3-4 and the Swiss franc. The belga quadruple ended gains of .01 cent. The Canadian dollar at a discount of 27-32 of a cent was 1-8 or a cent higher.

MONTREAL, June 19—(CP)—Prices were steady on the produce section of the Canadian commodity exchange Saturday.

Butter in lots to retailers was quoted at 26 cents for No. 1 solids 26 1-2 for No. 1 prints, 24 for No. 2 solids and 25 1-2 for No. 2 prints.

Graded egg shipments in cartons or less were 25 1-2 cents a dozen for A-large, 24 cents for A-medium, (23 1-2 for B-large, and 21 1-2 for C.

Cheese was 13 3-8-14 for Ont white 13 3-4-14 for Ont colored, 13 3-8 for Que colored and 13 1-2-3-4 for Que colored June.

Potatoes were 80 to 90 cents for No. 1 80's, 1.15 to 1.25 for P. E. I. mountains No. 1 90's, 5.00 to 5.50 for Virginia barrels No. 1, and 3.00 for North Carolina 100's No. 1.

He Set Fire To Vancouver

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

DUNCAN, B.C., June 19—George H. Keefer of nearby Cobble Hill, B. C., answered an old question today when he said he was accidentally responsible for the fire which raged through infant Vancouver June 13, 1886, to leave the little logging town of 5,000 population a heap of smoking ashes.

The story was told in the Cowichan Leader, weekly newspaper published in this Vancouver Island farming centre. Keefer said he reached the coast 53 years ago and took a contract to clear what is now Vancouver's west end.

"There was some dry brush which I thought might be a fire menace to the Indians," Keefer said, "so I set fire to this brush to clean it up."

"While we were at dinner the cook came in and asked: 'Did any of you fellows set a fire along the beach?'"

"I said: 'Yes, I did.'"

"Well," says the cook, "come and look at it now."

"We got up from the table and went to look. The fire had got into slushings and had a start that was beyond anything we could do.

"We watched the fire with fear and trembling all afternoon, and only when the sun went down and the wind with it were we able to get back to the city—or the place where the city was."

Stallion Owners Attention

Inspection of Stallions in Prince Edward Island has been completed for the year 1938. Lists of Registered and Grade Stallions with Inspection classifications are now available for distribution. Owners of stallions within the grades provided by the Stallion Enrolment Act are hereby notified that the penalties provided by the Act will be promptly applied in cases where enrolment and grading certificates have not been secured. Owners of adult stallions over 4 years graded "out" are also notified that such stallions are not permitted to travel for service but may operate at the owner's barns only. Young Stallions grading "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service. Owners of stallions that have not been inspected or enrolled must secure a provisional certificate from the Department of Agriculture. Prompt action will be taken against stallion owners operating contrary to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act.
