home consumption. Figures compiled

Merchant.

evening to listen to an address from Dr.
Annie Young, Medical Missionary to
Ceylon where she goes in October by
appointment of the American Presby-
terian Mission Board. She spoke for
nearly an hour and made a powerful
and earnest appeal to the Christian

in the darkness of heathendom. In
India there is only one Christian
worker to every 800,000, in China
there is one to every 2,800, while in the
