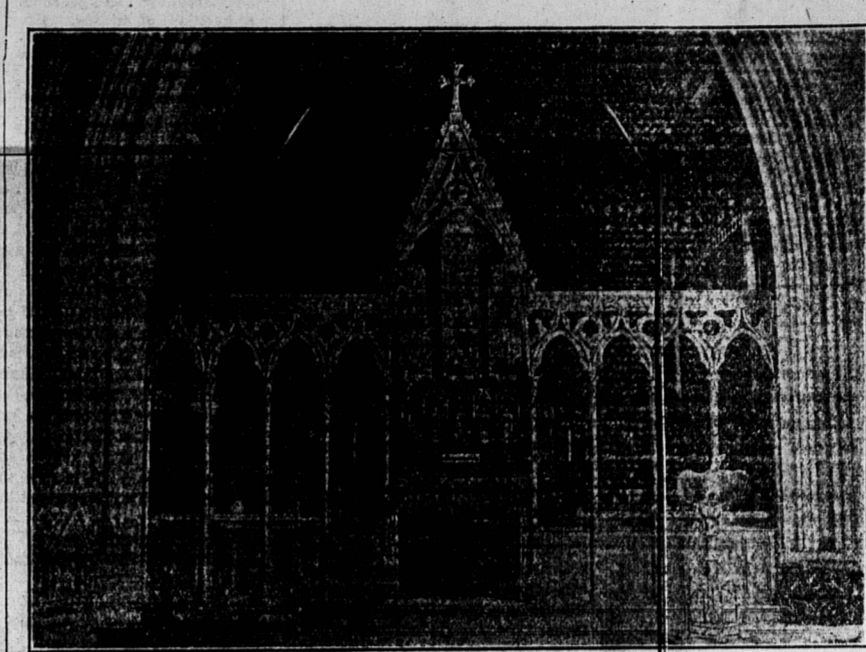

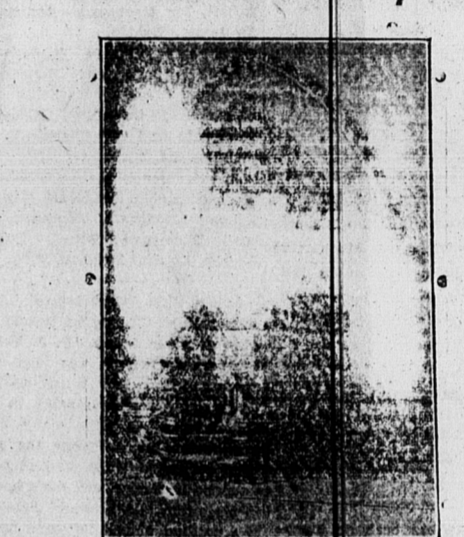

"What do these great principles of our faith mean?" asked Bishop MacKenley. "It is not that we can be proud of our position. Rather that you and I have a part to play in the propagation of the Gospel, that we share in the glorious privilege of leading others on. Here we see why there is so much indifference with regard to these fundamental matters to-day, because we do not recognize our own responsibility. It is almost a case of everyone for himself. Something is wrong and what is it? Just this, that too many people regard God as a theory. Some as a philosophy. But theories and philosophies are not going to make as strong in the strength of God supplied through His Eternal Son.

"It was not so with the great Apostle, St. Paul, who put his wonderful gifts in the right so that he might glorify God and all his fellow-men. And yet I show unto you a more excellent way. That way was through Faith, Hope and Love. The Sacrament of Baptism is essentially one of faith, that of Confirmation one of hope, hope that those confirmed will go forth as sons of the Living Church. The Sacrament of

the Holy Eucharist exemplifies the bond of love between all Christians. Love not as a sentiment but as the most practical thing in the world, love that knows no distinction and no end.

"What these first virtues," concluded Bishop MacKenley. "Let us love God because we have been at school with him—the school of the family life. This is the outward and visible sign of those inward and spiritual virtues, Faith, Hope and Love."
