LEAVE ON TRAINING COURSE.—Messrs. Wilfred Cullen and William Locke the two ratings chosen from the Charlottetown Company of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Force for the training cruise with the Special Service Squadron left here Saturday morning for Esquimaut, B. C. They will join up in Montreal with ratings from St. John, Quebec and Montreal all proceeding to the Pacific coast where they will embark on the H. M. S. Hood and H. M. S. Repulse. Leaving Vancouver on July 3rd these ships will cruise down the Pacific Coast through Panama Canal and up the Atlantic Coast arriving at Halifax on August 5th. Altogether two officers and fifty two men from the different companies of the R. C. N. V. R. throughout Canada make up the cruise, which is a wonderful opportunity for these Canadian seamen to get instruction in the most modern and powerful battle cruisers afloat. The H. M. S. Hood is 861 feet long, 106 feet beam, and draws 32 feet of water. Her main armament consists of 8-15 inch, 42 calibre guns 12-5-5 inch 50 calibre guns and 6-2-1 inch torpedo tubes. Her speed is 31 knots and has a complement of 177 officers and men. The H. M. C. S. Patriot is due in Charlottetown on July 16th, remaining here two weeks, and while here instruction will be carried on for the local men of the R.C.N.V.R. including a trip out in the Stratus for gunnery and torpedo running. There is also another cruise on the Light Cruisers of the West Indies Squadron, later in the Summer. Applicants wishing to join the R. C. N. V. R. should apply at drill shed Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

SPORTING NEWS

FIRST SERIES OF TROTS AND PACES ON JUNE 30

North Randall, O., Will Be the Scene Of Initial Meet Of the Well Known Grand Circuit.

One week from next Monday the "big line" trotters and pacers will make their debut at North Randall, O., where four important races will be staged. The inaugural series will be worth \$8,600 to the owners of the horses that finish well up in each event.

Speed and plenty of it will be seen at the opening in the Ohio town. All the events are three heat races, two of which will be trots and the other pair paces.

"The Edwards" is the feature of the afternoon. There is a \$5,000 stake for the 2:08 pacers that will be sent away in this annual race. The stakes for the other races will each have a value of \$1,200.

The following afternoon "The Ohio" will serve to lure a large crowd to the track. This event is for 2:03 trotters, and the entry is a large one.

As on the opening day the racing will be split for trotters and pacers, but the third day there will be three trots and only one pace. The big event Wednesday will be the trotting sweepstakes with \$1,500 added money.

This race is for horses eligible to the 2:03 class.

Four races are on the list for the campaign on Thursday, July 3. The three-year-old pace, sweepstakes, is the event of the day, but "The Tavern Stake" is also attracting its share of attention.

This has been a fixture for some time and, as the best \$5,000, one of the best 2:12 trotters will take the word.

There is a Free for All Pace on the final day, and this will help to keep the fireworks burning.

Roch, Margaret Dillon and Single G. should be seen in this important race. There is another pace and also two trots on the list.

In the event of rain on any of the days named, and the races should be postponed, an opportunity will be afforded the devotees of the sport to see their favorites the last day of the week.

Entries for the trot and pace, Manager Kinnaird then had a fine stager laid out for the opening day.

The curtain will ascend at Houlton and Presque Isle. In the former town they will celebrate Independence Day with a race before the Fourth and another bunch on the Fourth.

The boys at Presque Isle will do likewise on the nation's holiday, and Secretary Hayes has made elaborate plans for the entertainment.

From there the horses will move to Caribou for a series from July 7-11. After that the drive will be in the direction of Woodstock, N. B., which is on the St. John river, and but a short distance from Houlton.

They have barred Margaret Dillon, Sir Ioch and Single G. at Woodstock, N. B. The owners of good free for allers will not be afraid to enter now. They'll feel that they will have a chance for their money September 9 to 12.

With twenty nominations to each event at Lewiston, Me., for the early closing events, some fast racing is promised. More than 100 fast horses are training there at present.
