Two persons were killed and scores injured as violent electrical storms, accompanied at some points by severe hail, swept back and forth over Ontario yesterday. Damage was placed at hundreds of thousands of dollars, but positive estimates were unavailable. Communication by telegraph with numerous western Ontario points was disrupted for hours.

FIREMAN KILLED

Fireman Robert Calhoun of Toronto was killed when he and four companions plunged from a broken aerial ladder as they fought a blaze started by lightning in the dome of Our Lady of Lourdes Roman Catholic Church. Condition of two survivors was described as serious. Lukas Mijkowich, Bohemian immigrant, was killed by lightning at Wallaceburg.

Twenty-five children were rescued from Bell School at Milton after the roof collapsed and burned them in debris. None were injured seriously. A chimney crashed through the roof of a school at Winona and injured 20 pupils, three seriously.

DAMAGE AT OTTAWA

Ottawa reported damage estimated at \$90,000 was caused by hail stones as big as hens' eggs which fell at Suburban Cyrville, ruining nursery gardens and wrecking green houses. Numerous inhabitants were slightly injured before they could take cover. Unestimated damage was done at other suburban points.

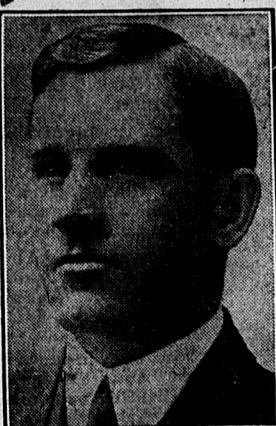
Scores of barns and other small buildings were demolished throughout western Ontario. Five Guelph collegiate students were hurt by flying glass as wind and hail drove in windows of their classrooms.

Hamilton reported streets flooded, wires brought down by falling trees and numerous buildings in the district unroofed. Highways were blocked throughout the Niagara Peninsula as trees crashed across them. Electrical services were disrupted from Niagara Falls to Toronto. Damage to orchards and garden stock on the Niagara Peninsula and through Western Ontario was reported extremely heavy.

Mollison's Off Today

LONDON, June 7.—James Mollison and his wife, Amy Johnson, planned to hop off from Croydon at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning for New York on their attempted double crossing of the Atlantic. The famous flying pair decided tonight to leave at dawn instead of later because a storm area is moving rapidly northward toward Newfoundland. They believe an early start will give them the maximum of daylight and enable them to reach the Newfoundland coast ahead of the storm.

Arsenault, who died in the Prince County Hospital following a traffic collision on Water Street last summer when he was thrown from his buggy.

ISLAND CLERIC PASSES AWAY AT CALGARY

Death Yesterday of Rev. William Cameron, Distinguished Graduate of St. Dunstan's University.

(C. P.) — Father William Cameron, prominent Roman Catholic cleric of Calgary, died here today following a three week's illness. He was principal of St. Mary's School for boys since 1918. Born in Grand River, Prince Edward Island, December 3, 1878, Father Cameron was educated in Charlottetown, winning the first Rhodes Scholarship for Prince Edward Island at St. Dunstan's College. (The late Father Cameron was a classmate of Rev. Dr. Murphy, the present Rector of St. Dunstan's University, and graduated with his B. A. Degree in 1902. He remained for two years on the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's and in 1904 went to Oxford University, England, as Prince Edward Island's first Rhodes scholar. After three years at Oxford he returned to St. Dunstan's where he taught for several years before entering the St. Augustine Seminary. Father Cameron was ordained in this Province in 1916 and went out to Calgary under Bishop McNally. Engaged first in parish work, he subsequently became principal of St. Mary's High School, which position he held until his death. His many friends in this Province, as well as throughout the West, will deeply regret to learn of Father Cameron's passing and will recall many instances of his zeal for learning and his Christian service.)

Farm Receipts Record Rise

TORONTO, June 7.—Three percent rise in cash receipts of Canadian farmers during the last month for which records are available was seen today by the Canadian Bank of Commerce as the most heartening development in Canadian economy in the past three years. The bank, in its monthly news letter, said if this rise in farm receipts continues "its beneficial effects will be felt in every channel of our economic and social life."

MUSSOLINI FOUR POWER PACT SIGNED

World Reconstruction Is Aim

Great Britain, France And Germany Forge New Link In European Peace Chain.

ROME, June 7.—(A.P.)—The Mussolini four-power pact, the aim of which is to assure European peace and open the way for world economic recovery, was signed tonight by the Italian Premier and the ambassadors of Great Britain, France and Germany.

In an address to the Senate announcing the adherence of the four great European states to the latest draft of the agreement, Premier Mussolini hailed the accord as a 10 year guarantee of peace and security in Europe.

The Duce's announcement was cheered enthusiastically by the Senate and by the diplomatic representatives of the other three participating governments who occupied seats in the gallery. Asserting that negotiations for the pact had met greatest difficulty over the article dealing with disarmament, Signor Mussolini declared the document as finally approved assures disarmament of the four powers in case of partial or complete failure of the Geneva Arms Conference.

Great Power Directorate

Alluding to fears of smaller states lest the new agreement institute a great power directorate which would impose its will upon others, Premier Mussolini asserted that

Presiding over the opening session was Rev. Robert Johnston of Ottawa, moderator for the past year. Beside him sat Rev. W. G. Brown of Saskatoon, Moderator in 1931.

In his farewell sermon, Dr. Johnston pleaded for a keener esprit de corps within the church.

Ryckman Sails For England

OTTAWA, June 7.—(C.P.)—Hon. E.B. Ryckman, Minister of National Revenue, sailed today from Quebec for England and will be absent from Ottawa about two months. While Mr. Ryckman's visit to Europe will be largely in the nature of a holiday it is understood he will remain in close touch with the Canadian delegation at the World Economic and Monetary Conference in London, opening June 12.

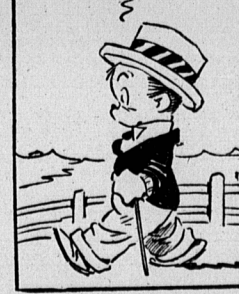
Matter Down
