THE COOK'S CORNER

AMBER MARMALADE

6 oranges
 2 lemons
 1 grapefruit
 3 quart cold water
 4 cups sugar
 6 cups Crown Brand Corn Syrup

Wash fruits remove peel and cut in very thin slices. Slice pulp thinly and set aside in a covered bowl. Cover peelings with cold water and let stand overnight. Next day bring to boiling point and add sugar and Crown Brand Syrup (which have been heated gently together but not allowed to boil). Add also sliced fruit pulp. Cook rapidly, stirring very often, till marmalade gives the jelly test (see Fresh Raspberry Jam for test)—(about 3-4 hours). Yield: Approx. 5 pints (Wine Measure).
