Presbytery Of P. E. I.

The Presbytery of P. E. I. held its stated meeting at the Church in Brookfield, on May 11th and elected Rev. J. A. McGowan, B.A., of Kensington to its Moderatorship. The Rev. T. H. B. Somers, Clerk, read the minutes and various items of correspondence. Mr. A. A. MacDonald, having informed the Court that he could not attend the General Assembly in Toronto in June, Dr. J. A. McMurdo of Summerside, was named to go in his place. A call was received from the Alberton-West Point Congregation in favour of the Rev. Geo. B. Cunningham, B.A., who has served this field one year as Ordained Missionary. Tentative arrangements were made for the induction on July 6th pending receipt of the acceptance of the call. It was reported that a student missionary, Mr. P. W. Page of Toronto had been appointed to Bradshaw Congregation for the summer. Because of Mr. Webster's illness, Rev. Chas. D. Henderson was named Chairman of the Commission for Dundas, Rev. T. A. Duke was named to replace Rev. R. D. MacLean and Mr. Milton Fraser to replace Mr. Beaton in its membership. Announcement was made of the visit next week of the Rev. Kenneth MacMillan of Niagara Falls, Ont., in the interests of "The Advance and Peace Thanksgiving." The members of the Presbytery were guests of the Congregation at supper. At the evening sederunt the Presbytery conducted the Induction Service of the Rev. Donald Nicholson into the Brookfield charge which includes the congregations of Brookfield, Harrisville, Glasgow Road and Hunter River. Mr. Nicholson has served this charge for the past year as ordained missionary and was given a unanimous call to its pastorate. Divine worship was conducted by the Moderator, assisted by the Clerk, and the sermon was delivered by the Rev. R. S. Quigley. By appointment Rev. D. A. Campbell addressed the Minister and Rev. P. N. Young addressed the congregation. The next Stated Meeting of the Presbytery will be held at Alberton on July 6th at 2 p.m.

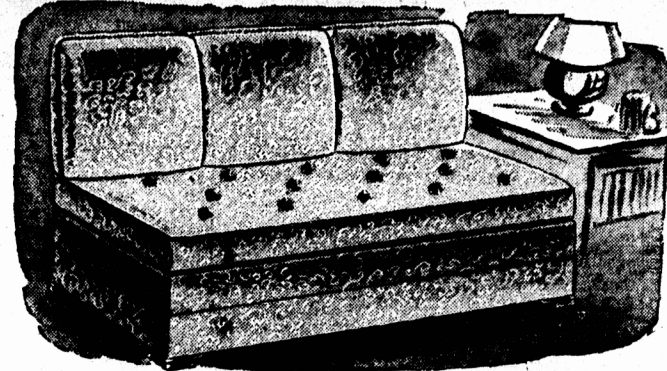
THE CALL OF SPRING

"Four seasons fill the measure of the year" — so sang an English poet. It is true that each season has its own appeal. Winter comes and seems to say, "Now we are in for a lull!" Summer bids us to look at her loveliness; Autumn shows her basket full of the fruit of the year — "What we sow we reap"; it is far more than a mournful dirge, it is a sort of paying time; Spring comes, probably most welcomed of all the four, and her lap is full of good things. One is hope. The grip of the winter is over, though often it is with evident reluctance that he releases his hold. Spring brings back the birds so that now the hedges are vocal with music. Bees suck honey from the flowers, the days are lengthening and come to their climax in June. People who have been housed for the winter, fearing the cold, are now enticed out of doors, and how sweet the air feels. What delight there is in seeing the opening buds and to hear the rustle of the leaves — all this gives this season a character of its own. Nature that seemed asleep is now awake and we have symbols of the resurrection all about us. The tides of being that seemed to have ebbed have come back, finding their way up the beaches of life, and bringing hope to the human heart. Then we feel the force of these lines: "Sin-blighted though we are, we too, The reasoning sons of men,

From one oblivious winter called Shall rise, and breathe again; And in eternal summer lose Our three-score years and ten." It too is the season of cooperation. Nature seems to say to man, "let us work together and produce a harvest, the kind bosom of the earth will support you, if you give her a chance. I will send the rain and bid the sun to shine and so together we shall feed a hungry world." Surely when we see the husbandman going out to his field and scattering the grain from his hand we have an exhibition of faith. Man and nature are trusting one another. What a rebuke this is to the divided counsels of today! In Spring, we have an illustration of the goodness and faithfulness of God. Long ago He said that while the world lasted the seasons would march in orderly procession across the fields of nature; there would be cold and heat, seed time and harvest, summer and winter, day and night. This has happened. There is a truth here, and what a rebuke to our duplicity. We have heard this question asked, "Who can paint like nature?" We might also ask, "Who tells the truth like nature?" "What you sow you reap"; she says and day follows night." Addison's hymn has it thus: "While all the stars that round her burn, And all the planets in their turn, Forever singing as they shine, The hand that made us is divine."

The world is full of sacraments. Do not the mountains speak of dependability — symbol of sleepless care were they to the Hebrew psalmist as he sought to comfort the people of Israel. So the recurrence of day and night ever since the time that God pronounced all His creation "good", and the procession of the seasons, with a step as orderly as a regiment — all these are witness to the dependability of our God. We are not living in a haphazard world, and yet in spite of it all are we not prone to unbelief? And yet the robin hopping on the lawn, the daisy in the meadow, the little rosy-cheeked girl with her skipping rope, the boy swinging on the gate or playing marbles, the old man enjoying the sunshine after being in doors all winter — seem to join their voices in a chorus, "Sursus corda!" "Lift up your hearts." This is the call of Spring. A Hebrew lover in the "Song of

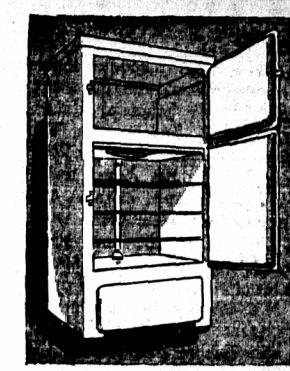
