**THE EDITOR'S MAIL**

**A DOCTOR'S LETTER FROM LABRADOR.**

Sir.—A letter has been received here from Mud Lake, Rigolet Inlet, Labrador, extract from which I herewith send you for publication which may be of interest to your readers: "The mail leaves here on 10 Dec. and this letter will probably reach you in March if nothing happens to it on the way. I have not to live in the camps, which are close and stuffy, but I board with the store keeper and have fitted up a nice room for myself and suit is just like home. The Grand River Pulp and Lumber Co. have two headquarters, one here and one at the mill 23 miles from here. This place is used only in the winter but in summer we all move up to the mill. They also have three lumbering camps, 4, 9, and 13 miles from here respectively. When any accident happens or any one gets sick I go in on the tote team which comes out here every day for supplies. Many natives, Eskimaux and others, live near here, about 15 or 20 families in all. There are about 100 children. They have no place for a school. If they had I might incur a heavy allowance by teaching them for some of their parents are very anxious to have them taught. Scarcely any of the older folks can either read or write. The one great theme of talk here is lumber, but I have some books with me with which for myself I can season this theme. I had rather a hard time getting here, after I left the steamer at Rigolet. I had to live there in a little room that I could hardly straighten out in with nothing to eat but sour bread and partridges, which I supplied with my own gun. All for the sum of \$4.50 per week. But I rally in about ten days my prayers were mercifully answered, and a schooner came down for goods. So after five days more on salt beef and hard tack I got here. It is all right now. We have had snow since the last of October, now about 18 inches. But the weather has been splendid. The sun shines every day but they say the cold has got to come, 30 or 40 degrees below zero. The air is dry and calm, so one may freeze, but you do not mind the cold like at home. Of course one has to put on a pile of clothes when it gets that cold, but so far I have not needed an overcoat except when driving. I had to go on a call the other night a distance of 25 miles with a dog team or a coastack as they call it here. We had seven dogs and I was gone only 4 1/2 hours but the going was heavy. Those teams can go eight or ten miles an hour if the ice is good, and keep it up all day. I found it pretty cold but ran part of the way. Grip is up here too though it does not come on like at home. Symptoms are: sudden onset, high fever, splitting headache, diarrhoea and sore back. If I get to them early I can have them up in three days, though they feel miserable for a week. I am paid extra for what I do outside of the Company and for any medicine I supply. I am the only doctor this side of Newfoundland, and have an area of 10,000 square miles, but unfortunately there are not very many people. I have a patient here now, who is a lawyer from New York, a Mr. Wallace by name. He and a Mr. Hubbard came up here last July and went on an expedition inland. Mr. Hubbard starved to death and this man was 11 days without anything to eat. Both his feet were frozen when he got here. He is looking fine now and I think he will not lose his feet or his toes. The trout fishing is splendid here. One can get with a hook and line over a hundred a day a few miles up the river. Barrels of them are fished out of the river and a large number of them are sold in the city so very plentiful. I shot about 15 partridges. Had I known enough before I came up here I might have loaded a ship, and I would have a truck up quite a lively trade.

As it is I have sold my gun and my watch and I guess by spring I will have sold everything except what I can carry away on my back.

I do not think I shall leave on the first boat which leaves here about the 1st of May, as that is the best time of the year here. Lots of flies. They take a bite out of your neck and go over and sit on a stump to eat it.

I think there is a good show for farming here, when the land is cleared off. Of course the season is short, but long enough to grow most anything. I have a notion to buy up a thousand acres and get it cleared. A fellow could make a fortune. Potatoes and oats could sell at 50 or 60c at least. Potatoes sell now at \$2.50 per barrel and ours are about 100 out already."
