CAPITOL SUMMERSIDE

Gets Suspended Sentence In Supreme Court

Stanley Gordon Pursey, who pleaded guilty to a charge of driving a motor vehicle to the common danger, was ordered by Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault yesterday afternoon to enter into his own recognizance to the amount of \$500 to appear before the Court at any time within the next 12 months for sentence.

His counsel, R. R. Bell, in asking the Court for a suspended sentence pointed to the war record of the accused who had served 15 months overseas and said the accused had always been a good character and had never been in any accident or in violation of any kind before. He reminded the Court that by virtue of section 1061, the Court could, in all sentences, grant a suspended sentence without the concurrence of the Crown. In this case, Mr. Bell said, the Crown had informed him a suspended sentence would not be opposed.

Mr. Justice Arsenault said it would have been better, in his opinion, had the prisoner gone to trial. He could have been given every way a poor man did not wish to fight a case without money. There was no evidence against the prisoner. There was no evidence he had been driving fast when the unfortunate accident occurred which resulted in the death of Lawson Crosby last August. Neither was there any evidence to show the prisoner had been drinking that night. It was, the Court said, one of those accidents which could easily happen.

There was no doubt the unfortunate victim had not been careful in getting out of the car. The bright lights of the car were always a danger to another car coming up. A person getting out of a car in the daytime is not careful of getting hurt unless he is careful. Mr. Justice Arsenault said, and the need for caution applies much more strongly when alighting from a car after dark.

In sentencing a prisoner, I am always ask myself: Mr. Justice, would you be satisfied if I were to let this man go and so I shall give him a suspended sentence. I hope to impress upon him and upon many others that a motor vehicle is a powerful instrument which must be handled with care and caution.

The Exchequer appeal case of Selma Lacroix was adjourned for judgment until Feb. 5. Lester O'Donnell appeared for the appellant.

The case of John Stanley Melvin McCormack, heard before Mr. Justice M. R. McGuigan, was adjourned until Jan. 25. McCormack charged under indictment with unlawful possession of a still, was defended by Lester O'Donnell. Court adjourned at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon until 10 o'clock, Friday morning, Jan. 25.
