THANKSGIVING DAY.

The call to observe a day of national thanksgiving in Canada is issued from year to year in the name and under the authority of the King. It is duly published in the Canada Gazette where very few of the people see the official text, which may be here repeated. It reads as follows:

"Whereas it hath pleased Almighty God, in His Great Goodness to vouchsafe this year to our Dominion of Canada a bountiful harvest and other blessings,—

"We, therefore, considering that these blessings enjoyed by Our people throughout the said Dominion do call for a solemn and public acknowledgment, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, to appoint, and We do appoint, Thursday, the eighteenth day of October next, as a day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest and other blessings with which Canada has been favored this year; and We do invite all our loving subjects throughout Canada to observe the said day as a day of General Thanksgiving.

"Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly."

So far as material prosperity is concerned Canada has rested under the smile of Heaven during the passing year. There has been a plentiful yield from the field, the sea, the mine and the workshop. Trade and industry have been busy and prosperous; labor has found steady employment. And these conditions have prevailed in Canada from year to year for a long time past. These are reasons for thanksgiving to be Giver of all good.

The Dominion has also this year and for many years past enjoyed a happy immunity for calamities and misfortunes that have befallen less favored lands. We have been free from war and insurrection, from plague and pestilence, from desolating volcanic eruptions and earthquakes. We have enjoyed a time of peace and health, of ordered liberty, of security for life and property, not surpassed in any land beneath the sun.

It is fitting that as a Christian people we should from time to time pause in our business and pastimes to take account of our manifold mercies and blessings. We have a vast and goodly heritage, broad and fertile, with land enough, and work and bread for all. Ours is a land of abundant sunshine and sufficient rain. Our climate is beautiful and invigorating. In the lifetime of our old men we have seen no foreign foe upon our soil. Our rulers and lawmakers are of our own choosing. No tax can be laid upon us but by our own consent. The church and the school-house are everywhere throughout the land. Surely all these are causes for thanksgiving to Almighty God.

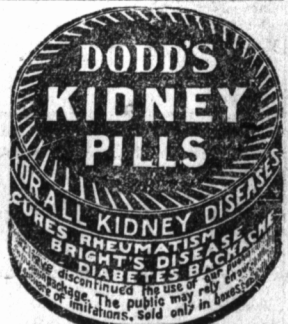
Regrettably there are great evils in Canada, as in all lands, social vice, intemperance, political corruption, betrayals of public trust, greed, for unlawful gain. These are of our own making, or permission and call for national humiliation. But the heart of the Canadian people is, we believe sound, greatly regretful of these evils and not unmindful of the obligation and the pleasure of rendering thanksgiving to Almighty God for the abundant blessings He has bestowed upon the Canadian people. And we trust they are thankful also for our good and wise King, who from year to year thus devoutly calls the Canadian people to this solemn service of thanksgiving.

CLAIMING TOO MUCH.

The Patriot as a stalwart party organ, sometimes, no doubt unconsciously, claims a little too much for its party. In its issue of Monday, referring to the increased subsidies to Provinces, it recalls its watchword to the people at the election of 1904—"Keep in line with the Government at Ottawa and thus secure settlement of our claims." Now it so happens that the provincial Governments of Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia have not heeded the Patriot's sage advice. They have not "kept in line with the Government at Ottawa." And yet in the matter of getting their claims settled and having their subsidies increased they seem to have fared as well as we have.

THE RELIEF FUND.

As all are aware a subscription list has been opened in Charlottetown for the relief of those who have suffered by the disastrous fire in Summerside. The list is at the City Hall where all who are able and disposed to give are invited to call and contribute what they can afford for this worthy object. For a town of its size Summerside has suffered most severely. Many have lost their homes and some have had all their worldly possessions swept away, and this just at the beginning of the cold season. These



are conditions which make the call for aid somewhat urgent one. Besides, this is the season of thanksgiving. Charlottetown has long been spared the disaster of a sweeping conflagration. For these reasons, and for the further reason that our time to suffer in like manner may yet come, we trust the subscriptions from Charlottetown may be on a generous scale.
