THERE was a full house and great interest at the rooms of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society last evening to listen to Mr. Newson's address on the tides. He was equipped with an excellent series of diagrams and varied apparatus including one of his own invention for illustrating the motion of the moon about the earth. Mr. Newson argued that the theories of Newton, La Place and others did not agree with each other, were illogical, and failed to account for various phenomena connected with the tides. His own theory was that of electric or magnetic attraction and repulsion, which he elaborated at some length. Mr. May followed making a clear argument on the basis of the gravitation of matter, and holding that the tides are due to the difference of attraction of the moon and sun upon the two sides of the earth and waters next to and opposite them respectively. Mr. Newson replied to each speaker briefly, Mr. McCreedy inclined to support Mr. May's position. Capt. Jos. Read made a clear and forcible address differing from both Mr. Newson and Mr. May, and pointing out where he thought they were wrong. Mr. Duall called attention to some points in the electrical theory that had not been touched upon. There was a general desire to hear others who had been named by President Watson, including Rev. Mr. Dobson, Mr. Pope, Mr. Morrison and others but time would not admit. Mr. Newson was accorded many complimentary words and the hearty thanks of the meeting for his able and thought-provoking introduction of the subject. All present were deeply interested.

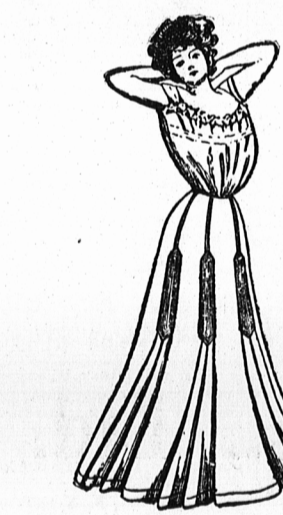
