Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Mutart of Carleton returned Monday evening from their honeymoon trip through the Maritimes.

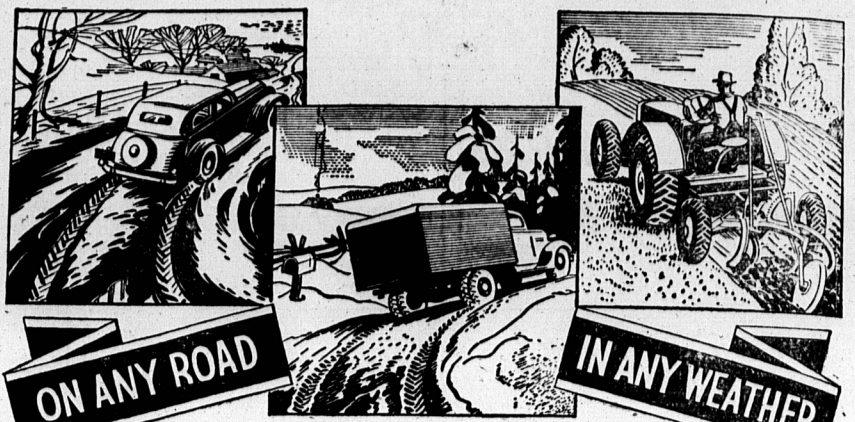
Mr. and Mrs. Russell MacDonald of Carleton are spending their vacation in Ottawa.

Passengers should be in possession of a letter IN DUPLICATE from their bank manager, clergyman or government official, certifying as to their name and complete address; citizenship; intended length of stay in the United States; and the name and complete address of person to whom destined. The letter should be signed by applicant in the presence of the issuing official.
Persons who are NOT citizens of Canada, or British subjects domiciled in Canada, require passports issued by an American Consul.
This letter may also be used when re-entering Canada.
