DEAD BURIED UNDER MASS OF MOLTEN METAL

The Results of The Pittsburg Explosion Worse Than at First Anticipated

Pittsburg, Jan. 11.—Partial investigation to ascertain the number of fatalities that occurred at the Eliza furnaces of the Jones & Laughlin Steel Company, Limited, when an accumulation of gas exploded, burning the base of the large furnaces and showering tons of molten metal over about forty men, was completed tonight.

The result shows that the bodies of twelve men, horribly mutilated, have been recovered and from fifteen to twenty men are missing. It being generally believed their bodies were consumed by the hot metal, and ten men are in hospital terribly burned, four of them expected to die.

It is doubtful whether the number of men killed will ever be known. From present indications over 15 men were caught by the metal which flowed over their bodies to a depth of six feet. No trace of them, it is said, will ever be found. Of the dead bodies now in the morgues several are minus legs and heads, while the others are burned and twisted beyond recognition. The condition of the injured is pitiful. A lumber of them have their eyes burned out and other were so badly injured that amputation of limbs was necessary.

REPORT ON THE ISLAND INDIANS By Commissioner

Facts Regarding The Micmacs of This Province For The Year 1906—They Number 284 Souls.

SOME ACCOUNT OF THE SHAH'S WAY OF LIFE

How The Deceased Ruler of Persia Used to Spend His Days—Some of His Eccentricities.

London January 10.—The late Shah of Persia, Mozaffar ed-Din Mirza (King of Kings) Shah of Persia, was born on March 25, 1833, and succeeded to the throne on May 1, 1896. Apart from many harmless eccentricities, he displayed since his accession a keen interest in the welfare of

his subjects and a desire to increase the opportunities of his kingdom rarely exhibited by Oriental potentates. Since he ascended the throne in 1896, he accomplished many reforms and encouraged an adaptation to western ideas equalled only among eastern peoples by Japan.

He rode a swift automobile. He was interested in the sciences and arts. He established free education in his dominions and granted his subjects the blessings of a free and unfettered press. He encouraged his nobles to send their sons to Europe to be educated, and he himself entrusted the education of his sons to European professors, who have given them a thoroughly western education.

Formerly the government farmed out the taxes, a system which led to unutterable abuses. Now the customs are under the direct control of the government, and the change has brought about a great increase in the revenue.

He had many Europeans in his household and among his officials, but these were quickly replaced by Persians when the natives showed they had sufficiently assimilated the instruction given them by the foreigners.

He was with great reluctance that he was ever brought to sign a death warrant, a trait of character for which credit is seldom given to eastern monarchs, who are popularly thought to slice off heads with the same unconcern as with which they would peck an orange.

The Shah was an early riser. He got up at daybreak, but did not leave his apartments until about 8 o'clock. All the ministers and household gathered outside his rooms to wait his appearance. A servant as he saw his master approach, uttered cry and held up the rich hanging.

He then held converse with his ministers in the gardens of the palace, walking to and fro amidst the gorgeous luxuriance of an Eastern garden. On his return to the palace he had the newspapers read to him by his secretaries.

The Persian and French papers he read himself, but all the others were translated, as the Shah did not talk German, Russian or English.
