WOOL GRADING AND WOOL PRICES

The St. John Telegraph says: J. D. Thomson, expert wool grader, representing the livestock branch at Ottawa, assisted by J. K. King, B. S., another representative of the live stock branch, have finished grading the wool accumulated at the Fredericton warehouse and have classified it as follows: Fine medium, 5 per cent.; medium, 53 per cent.; low medium, 34 per cent.; coarse, 3 per cent.; rejects, 4 per cent.; tags, 4 per cent.

On June 11 the wool valuator from Ottawa and Washington, accompanied by T. Reg. Arkell, manager of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers Limited, Toronto, appraised the wool at the Fredericton warehouse and placed the following valuations on the springs grades: Fine medium, 8 1/2 cents per pound; medium, 7 3/4 cents per pound; low medium, 7 1/2 cents per pound; coarse, 6 7/8 cents per pound; tags, 2 3/4 cents per pound.

These prices are very satisfactory to the officials of the department at Fredericton and undoubtedly will be equally satisfactory to those growers who have participated in this undertaking. It will be noted that the major portion of the wool has graded as low medium and medium, and that the price ranges from 7 1/4 cents to 7 3/4 cents with 8 1/2 for the fine medium. These prices are less freight to Boston, which will amount to about one-half cent per pound, thus giving an average of from 75 to 76 cents for wool in the grease.

The wool accumulated at the Moncton warehouse has graded slightly higher than at the Fredericton warehouse, consequently the wool growers in the Moncton district will receive a higher average price for their wool than those wool growers in the Fredericton district.

The two warehouses at Fredericton and Moncton will continue to take in wool during the entire month of June thus giving wool growers who have held their wool an opportunity to market through the co-operative association.

(It will be remembered that Prince Edward Island wool last year graded 74 per cent. medium, a considerably higher percentage than that shown in New Brunswick this year.)

The prices quoted above are for unwashed wool and may be taken as the price for the seasons clip. The wool experts strongly advise the marketing of wool unwashed. It may be noted that the above figures represent the equivalent of a much higher price for unwashed wool as washing reduces the weight considerably.)

"AT LAST I AM FREE" WROTE HON. DR. BELAND JOYFULLY TO HIS SISTER IN QUEBEC

MONTREAL, June 18.—The first letter from Hon. Dr. Beland, M. P., for Beauce, since his release from a German prison has been received by his sister, Mrs. Dr. Nadeau, of Beauce Junction. The text follows: My dear Ernestine. At last I am free. Can it be believed, after a long and painful captivity of three years? Here in brief form is the story of my release.

On the nineteenth of April I was called to the Kommandatur of Berlin and taken there by a sub-officer. There they said to me "You will be exchanged next week. Prepare to leave for Holland." You know the effect that announcement would have. I almost stopped breathing. There were five or six days before me, but I began immediately to pack up. Two days later the officer in charge of the Stadtroger came to my cell and said to me: "The Minister of War orders that if you desire you may go by any route to Rotterdam and pay a visit to your children at Chapellen."

Naturally I accepted. It would take, I was told, three or four days to communicate with the German Government of Belgium and receive authorization to travel through the occupied country. I waited.

Chappellen Visit Refused I wrote immediately to Chappellen to announce the happy news of my release and my visit. Then after two eternal weeks of impatient waiting, the same officer came again. He was to accompany me to Belgium, but he announced that the trip to Chappellen was refused by the military authority, "for military reasons."

It was necessary to do directly into Holland. Three days more were necessary to procure my photographs, my passports, etc., military authority, police or constabulary authority, and Her Majesty the Queen of the Netherlands. All three required a ream of precautionary papers, guaranteed signatures stamps, visas and re-visas, decorated with my

pretty little photographs showing me as almost dead. The journey was fixed for Friday evening the 19th of May at nine o'clock. The station of control and a decision at the Dutch frontier was notified by wire of my three or four prison companions, some very brave Englishmen, and of my cell, No. 669, which I had occupied for three years. We all had tears in our eyes.

Courtesy Shown All the sub-officers were present to shake hands with me and the First Lieutenant—Directing Officer of the Stadtroger, who had received orders to accompany me to the frontier. Thanks to him an entire first-class compartment was put at our disposal.

The next morning we changed cars at Essen. Thence we came to Wesel and to the frontier station at noon on Saturday. Because of an error in the Order which had been given for the checking of my baggage, it went to another frontier station. The telegraph wires were brought into action and the next morning the valises arrived.

After a most minute examination of everything I had with me, I took leave of my officer and at eleven minutes past one o'clock I passed the frontier at last. I was the guest of the charming Wilhelmina. It is impossible to describe these sensations and these emotions.

For a Brave Lad At five o'clock I was at Rotterdam. This morning, Monday, I sent a cablegram to Nadeau and one to Sir George Perley. The last parcel I received at Berlin was the Doctor's first shipment of codliver oil. I took it for only five days. The rest of it will go to a Mr. Hall, a brave lad interned for three years and ill. I do not know when Jeanette (his daughter) will be able to join me. A lot of correspondence is necessary and that may take some weeks. Meantime I am free. I eat well. I walk. I take the air. All goes well. I shall write again in a few days.

BULGARIA SEETHING WITH DISCONTENT

LONDON, June 17.—The correspondent of the Daily News in Geneva says that serious political and economic discontent is reflected in the latest Bulgarian newspapers reaching there. So violent are some of the attacks against Germany that the censor has felt obliged to interfere. A food shortage is most acute but the Government newspapers assure the people there is no fear of a famine and call for the public hanging of Socialist agitators. The Bulgarian army is very poorly fed and mutinies are continuous.
