CONVENTION OF N. S. GRAND LODGE OF MASONS BROUGHT TO CLOSE.

HALIFAX, June 11.—One of the most successful and largely attended Grand Lodge conventions, which fittingly celebrated the semi-centennial of that great Masonic body in the province of Nova Scotia was brought to close at Halifax tonight by the installation of officers. At this evening's session retiring Grand Master Christie officiated as installing officer, and P. G. Master Crossman as president. The convention has been marked by harmony, expeditious work, and several features of exceptional interest. In the morning session \$1,000 was voted for the Canadian Patriotic Fund. In addition to this munificent gift \$2,000 was voted as a fund to assist and support Masons who may be in want because of the war. Brother James C. Jones, of Halifax, was appointed assistant grand secretary. A standing vote of thanks was extended to retiring Grand Master Christie, expressing strong appreciation of his work, a vote of thanks being extended to him.

FROM THE FRONT

The following interesting letter from one of the Islanders now at the firing line, has been received by Mr W. S. Louson:—

France, May 24th, 1915.

Dear Friend Louson,—Just a line to-day to acknowledge receipt of your welcome letter, which I received two or three days ago. Your letters always seem to help somehow or other. Well, I've intended to write you a long letter for some time, but things are too swift here for one to write a decent letter. We are in an even worse place than Ypres. I intended writing you an account of the smashing of that town, but I am enclosing a clipping from an English paper which describes it fairly well. I see by the papers that some of the Island boys are leaving for the front. The one and only need here is men, Louson. If you at home could only understand conditions here and what our men are really up against, I think you would be able to get a P.E.I. Company with each draft. As far as one can judge now it will keep the Dominion pretty busy to keep one division here just to give you an idea, we lost about 700 in our battle at Ypres and up to last night we have lost over 800 here, with 15 officers. Now just consider those figures for a moment. This loss has taken place since April 22nd, just one month, so we will want 1,000 men and over 40 officers to keep our strength up since that time. Don't run away with the idea that Germany is nearly beaten, or dream that she is short of shells of food. Anyone that thinks she is short of shells wants to come here and listen for a week or two. I don't like to say anything about recruiting, but it certainly seems slow to here. Think if our island boys here knew that a whole company of Islanders were coming out next week—well, you can imagine how good they would feel about it. Well, Louson, it seems like ages since we were home and looks like a longer time before we will get there. It's just pure luck (or is it something greater?) that one escapes from week to week in this country. You are never safe a minute, and oh, the dreaded hot weather coming with the flies. I hate to think of it. This place will be a fly's paradise sure. Well, write me often. I'll send you a long letter soon. Sincerely,
