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ANALYSIS OF THE HAMBURG PROGRAM

I have been asked to give a few analytical remarks upon the various items of the program of piano music to be played by Mark Hambourg this evening at the Opera House. As it is manifestly impossible to deal with each separate item in detail within the short space of this column, I shall confine my remarks to one or two of the more important works that appear on the program. The Toccata and Fugue in D minor by Bach is one of the most brilliant of a series of organ works written by that grand old contrapuntalist, Johann Sebastian Bach stands in music, very much as Euclid stands in mathematics. He is in fact, generally spoken of as the Euclid of music, and this fine example of his work, as transcribed for the piano by Tausig a man who delighted in creating difficulties for the piano, can only be described by one word, colossal.
