NOTES ON THE 6TH P. E. I. EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE SECOND WEEK ENDING NOVEMBER 14th, 1923

The P. E. I. Egg Laying Contest made good progress during the second week. Eight pens have started to lay, for a total of 89 eggs. During the week 60 eggs were laid.

The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 13 led the Contest for the week with 14 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12 second with 11 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 15 third with 8 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 14 fourth with 8 eggs. Mr. Sam McPherson pen of White Leghorns led for fifth with The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 10 with 7 eggs each.

RADIO RELAY LEAGUE

Word has been received from Hartford, Conn., that Capt. Wm. Coates Borrett, well known amateur radio operator of Dartmouth, N. S., has been appointed Manager of the Maritime Division of the American Radio Relay League, on recommendation of Mr. Keith Russell of Toronto, the Canadian General Manager.

The Maritime District includes Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Capt. Borrett will have charge of all A. R. R. L. amateur activities in this district. Canada is divided into five Districts for radio purposes. The American Radio Relay League is an international, non-commercial association of radio amateurs, bonded for the more effective relaying of friendly messages between their stations, for orderly operation, and for the improvement of practical two way, short wave, radiotelegraphic communication.

Its affairs are governed by a Board of seventeen directors, elected every two years by the general membership. The officers, in turn, are elected by the directors from among their number. The membership is now over twenty thousand strong in the U. S. A. and Canada. The League is non-commercial and no one commercially engaged in the manufacture, sale or rental of radio apparatus is eligible for membership on the board of directors.

"Of by and for the amateur" is number within its ranks practically every worthwhile amateur in the U. S. A. and Canada, and also many in France and England, and has a history of glorious achievement as the standard bearer in amateur radio affairs.

On several occasions the League has slipped into the breach and kept up communication for the Railways and Government, when storms have destroyed the telegraph lines. Another important work it is doing at present is in keeping in touch as far as possible with the schooner "Deywick," which is now frozen in for the winter at Refuge Harbour, North Greenland, making scientific observations.

During December special tests are to be made with the English amateurs to try and establish two way communication between Great Britain and North America. The many amateurs throughout the Maritime Provinces will be glad to know of the appointment of Capt. Borrett, and will look forward to getting in touch with him by radio through his amateur radio station, 1-DD, which has a regular night range of over one thousand miles. One of the first objects in view is to establish regular amateur radio communication between Halifax and St. Johns, Newfoundland, thus completing the chain from St. Johns to Vancouver by amateur radio.

Capt. Borrett is anxious to get in touch with amateurs in P. E. I., and if there is a reasonable amount of activity on the Island, an Assistant District Manager will be appointed by him for that section of the Maritime Division. So write and tell him what you are doing.

The Mitchell Inquiry

Verbatim Report of the Proceedings of the Commission Appointed by Order of the Council to Inquire Into the Conduct of Andrew Fraser Mitchell, Recently Dismissed Immigration Agent for This Province.

Continuation of Capt. Duthies' evidence before Commissioner C. R. Smallwood, K. C. Nov. 14th. Examination by the Attorney General.

Q. Did Mitchell keep his appointment with you?
A. Yes.

Q. What happened?
A. He told me that the Government of Prince Edward Island had a proposition for settling ex-convicts people on the Island.

Q. He said the Government of this Province?
A. Yes, and he outlined the scheme to me more or less in the same terms that Capt. Butler has already related except that I had the impression that it was actually Government land or that the Government had some control over it. I remember at the time that I could not get very much information as regards figures, as to how I was to make a living on the land, and I remember discussing it with Capt. Butler later on. I think he was probably acting for other people. He may have been quite sincere, but he simply did not know very much about the proposition himself. I told him (Mr. Mitchell) that I should not care to come out alone but if he could give me the names of other Indian army officers, I was willing to go into partnership with anyone. Then he told me about Capt. Butler.

Q. On this occasion did he tell you of any other Indian officers who had taken up land?
A. No, he did not give me any names. He said he would not like to furnish any names. If I gave him my name he would show it to various people, with my consent. But I said that unless I had a partner I would not go. I should not care to go alone.

Q. Did he tell you how you were to make a living?
A. He just outlined more or less the details that Capt. Butler has mentioned, along the same lines of fox farming and market gardening. He said the land was being sold at cost and that we could not buy land any cheaper on the Island; he had no financial interest whatever in the scheme and the whole thing was being done at cost price, solely for our benefit.

Q. He quoted you a price at that time?
A. Yes. Then I said I would wait until I heard about a partner, and he eventually wired to me that Capt. Butler would see me at 7 o'clock in the office. I went and met him there and we had quite an interview, the three of us, for about two and a half hours.

Q. Did you reach a conclusion that night?
A. Yes, we agreed that we would settle up with Mr. Mitchell and he

at Amherst. We landed on the 3rd, remained a day at Halifax and came on to Charlottetown with Capt. Butler. On the way he told us that we were not to receive the plot 55 which we had selected at London.

Q. Have you seen this plan? (Large map produced by the Commissioner).
A. This appears to be exactly the same as we saw in London, but since arriving here I have seen a different one. (Small map produced). That is on a smaller scale. I do not seem to recognize that. I saw another one with Mr. Thompson which showed the divisions of the land and the names of three different property owners.

Q. At any rate it was a copy of this large plan that you saw in London?
A. I believe so, yes.

Q. You got plot 55 in London?
A. Yes.

Q. And you found that was not the plot you had been given, when you arrived here?
A. Yes. The only way we could recognize our plot was that it had a stream running through it. We knew that we had to get water somehow, and the land we were shown had no water.

Q. Did you see the land with the water?
A. No. We tried to find it but nobody seemed to know about it. Capt. Dudley did not know. We motored over to see Hon. Mr. Sinclair in the evening and then we went out and saw the land that we were to be given.

Q. And you were not satisfied with the location?
A. No.

Q. Suppose you had received the plot with the stream in it?
A. Well, I think we would have been satisfied then, because we did not know anything about land very much at the time.

Q. You were in the same position with regard to information as when you bought it?
A. Yes, and it was not liking the land at the time that put us on the track of making various inquiries. After we got back that evening and told Dudley that we did not like the proposition he saw that we were rather dissatisfied and showed us a cable from Mitchell. My impression was that Dudley had called to Mitchell and informed that we were not quite satisfied and he had a reply to the effect that we were to be reminded of the guarantee. That is what the cable said; so we asked what that meant and Dudley said it referred to a refund in the event of us being dissatisfied with the scheme.

MR. INMAN: Dudley said that?
A. Yes, he interpreted it in that way. He showed us the cable but it did not give any terms of the guarantee at all. We told Capt. Dudley that we did not like the idea at all and that we had better find out something more about it. He said, "Before you do that go and see Mr. Thompson; he has more authority than I have." So we returned then to Amherst and spent a week there. Mr. Thompson said he could not do very much for us at the time as he would have to cable Mr. Mitchell for authority. In the meantime we
