Mustering Out

Benefits Increased

OTTAWA, Aug. 10—(CP)—Mustering out benefits for servicemen estimated at \$750,000,000 and an increase in the allowances from \$65 to \$100 were announced today in the Commons.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King, introducing war service gratuity legislation, said the benefits would go to volunteers, drafted men obligated to serve without limitation of time in the Americas and to members of the women's services.

For every 30 days of service in the Western Hemisphere which for the purpose of the bill includes the West Indies, Newfoundland and South America, and excludes the Aleutians, \$7.50.

For every 30 days service overseas, which includes the Aleutians, Iceland and Greenland, \$15. Also for each six months of service overseas—including the Aleutians, Iceland and Greenland, seven days' pay and allowances.

And a re-establishment credit. While full details of the Bill are not yet available, it was announced that the gratuity would be paid out in monthly instalments of unspecified size.

Those qualifying for the benefits will be the volunteer servicemen, women, Canadians serving in other Empire forces who return to Canada within a year after discharge, approximately 100,000 men and women already discharged from active service, drafted men who served in the Aleutian campaign and drafted men who might be forced by order-in-council to serve overseas.

In this latter case their qualifications for gratuities would start from the time they were drafted to active service. The war gratuity will be applied to drafted men who may later volunteer for general service.

Word was received by Mr. and Mrs. M. J. MacLeod of 9 Birchwood St., Charlottetown, on the 8th instant that their son, Pilot Officer Lowell Milton Brahaud, had been killed overseas on the 5th of August.

They have since been advised that his funeral was to take place at 10:30 a.m. on August 10th at Stonefall Cemetery, Harragat, Yorkshire, England.
