boarded it and went to Summerside. Later he returned with a Mountie and a town policeman. They pushed the Crane car to the side of the road. The policeman then returned to Wellington and told witness that they would return and take her and his wife, child and mother to Summerside.

During that time he said ours were passing and he would flash his flashlight to warn them. After about a half hour of waiting in the direction of Summerside and stopped opposite the Crane car. Witness said he did not know who was driving this car but he thought there was a soldier and an airman in it. The driver left his lights on and the car was parked on the side of the road. Another automobile approached from west and drove between the two other cars.

Witness said he saw the car and striking his mother and carrying her about a hundred yards on the fence before she fell off. The witness found his mother lying on the pavement and bleeding profusely. The car #1 at that time was driving fast, he said. The police arrived back shortly after and they took his mother to hospital. In answer to a question of the jury foreman the witness said he had not been drinking and he saw no evidence of liquor on any of those involved in the accident.

Dr. W.B. Howatt testified to being called at about 2 or 2:30 o'clock that morning to the hospital. On arriving there he found a woman's body in a car at the hospital door. He examined her and found that she was dead and had been for about an hour. Both her legs were badly shattered and she had lacerations on the forehead of one ear. He could not definitely determine what had caused her death without a complete examination.

National Nurses' Day

Yesterday was National Nurses' Day in observance of that day in 1854 when Florence Nightingale, the graduate and student nurse of the R. C. Hospital, London, England, attended divine worship. Nurses and student nurses from Falconwood Hospital and the Provincial Infirmary were also in attendance and were the members of the nursing section of the Red Cross.

The Catholic nurses worshipped at the First Baptist Church where the Rev. I. J. Levy preached a sermon appropriate to the occasion.

The Catholic nurses attended a special Mass in the hospital chapel, the celebrant being the Rev. Louis Deagan. Appropriate hymns were sung by the Sisters' Choir with Miss Frances Hennessey as soloist.

At 8:15 P.M., the nurses once more returned to their chapel where the Rev. Father Crowley, C.S.B., preached an effective sermon appropriate to the day. This was followed by the Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. The Sisters and Nurses' Choir under the direction of Sister Mary Magdalene sang hymns during the Benediction. The soloist was Miss Phyllis Blanchard.

National Nurses Day was also observed at Summerside where the nurses attended services at St. Mary's and St. Paul's churches.

Missing S'ide Soldier Safe

Pte. Alton Gaudet, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Gaudet, Summerside has been liberated in Germany and is now safe in Allied hands, according to word received by his wife, the former Dorothy Gaudet, over the week-end. Pte. Gaudet was reported missing on March 10 and this is the first word received since that date. He joined up at the outbreak of war while in Canada and was in Newfoundland when he was overseas in August of 1944.

A brother Cpl. Arthur Gaudet was killed on Feb. 28, 1945. Two other brothers are in the services, L-Cpl. Raymond in Halifax and Sgt. Major Clifford in Debert.—S.

Says Laval To Be Handed To Allies

LONDON, May 6—(OP)—A French Telegraph Agency dispatch from Madrid, broadcast today, has quoted the Spanish Foreign Minister, Jose Felix Lequerica as saying that Pierre Laval, former Vichy premier, would be handed over to the Allies.

Lequerica was quoted as saying that the Spanish Government desired the return of Laval as soon as possible, since he could remain in Spain "in whatever capacity" the dispatch said that Lequerica's statement was made in the presence of Allied press representatives.

P. E. I. Soldier One Of First To Enter Utrecht

WITH THE 1ST CANADIAN ARMY, May 6—(CP Cable)—Two Canadians had a preview of the Netherlands town of Utrecht Saturday.

Capt. J. W. P. Fielding of Toronto, driven by Pte. Pleading Bagdie of Missouche, P.E.I., was behind German lines for seven hours escorting the first British Red Cross medical personnel to enter Germany through faulty main emergency feeding centres.

Although elsewhere on the 21st Army Group front the German surrender was effective at 8 a.m. yesterday, the enemy still manned the Grebbe Line, running south from the Zelder Zee to the Neter Rhine. Guards at the barrier did not know that Field Marshal Von Blakowitz, German commander, had agreed to allow medical teams to enter before formal capitulation.

It looked as though the medical men would not get in until Blakowitz's chief of staff arrived, recognized the identity of Sir Jack Drummond of Capt. Bryan's party and authorized their passage.

A German officer whom Capt. Bryan later described as "a typical Nazi, six feet three inches tall, about four feet broad," climbed into the back seat of the jeep and a German sergeant major mounted a motorcycle ahead of the party.

The small convoy actually was bound for Billhoven where the medical men had an appointment with a Netherlands Health Ministry executive but they rolled into Utrecht through faulty main emergency feeding centres.

Utrecht's citizens greeted the Allies to sweep triumphantly into the city and thronged the streets. British, American and Netherlands flags decorated the buildings and the roadways were sprinkled with flowers and streamers.

The Allied vehicles were surrounded and had to inch their way forward, to the German officers' discretion.

As soon as this preliminary reconnaissance is completed, the remainder of the British Red Cross medical mission will follow into western Holland.

ALL CANADA'S (Continued From Page 1) Oldenburg surrendered to the 2nd—the only German city to capitulate to the Canadians until the general surrender across the whole front. The 3rd Division concluded its operations in areas east and north-east of Embs and the mouth of the Ems. The 2nd Armored Brigade supported both the 2nd and 3rd Divisions at various times in north-east Holland and northwest Germany and had tanks with both divisions in their final positions on the left flank of the 2nd, on a line eight to 10 miles north of Oldenburg. The 5th Armored Division transferred here from Italy, finished up in northeast Holland garrisoning Leuwarden and Groningen and holding the Dutch North Sea coast in northeast Holland, forced the surrender of Groningen and Arnhem and then pushed westward to the Neter Rhine and the Lek. The 2nd Division finished up along a general line five miles north and northeast of Oldenburg in northwest Germany. In the final weeks of the war, its units fought in northeast Holland, forced the surrender of Groningen and Arnhem and then pushed westward to the Ems estuary. The 1st Canadian Corps directed operations in West Holland while the 2nd Canadian Corps directed those in northwest Germany.
