**ROTARY CLUB.**—This week with all the farmers meetings being held the Charlottetown Rotary Club is having a special Farmers Luncheon. About fifty farmers have been invited and the gathering will be held at the Victoria Hotel on Friday at 1 o'clock. There will be a number of important addresses by outstanding representatives of the Farmers interests and altogether the event promises to be the most important yet held by the Rotary Club.

**ISLANDER DEAD.**—A letter received by Mr. L. A. Hazard of this city, contains the sad news of the death of his brother Mr. T. Walter Hazard, at Beavertown, N.S. The deceased who resided in Charlottetown for many years where he was employed as one of the first mail clerks, removed to Alberta in 1914 and has been engaged in farming at that place. He enjoyed good health until last spring when he contracted influenza, from which he never completely recovered. He passed away on Saturday, December 27th ultimo. The funeral was held on December 30th. There are left to mourn a widow, four sons and two daughters to whom much sympathy is extended.

**LONG AND FAITHFUL SERVICE.**—Our esteemed citizen Mr. W. T. Huggan, enters his 51st consecutive year of service in the Intercolonial Railway, now the Canadian National Railway. On January 14th 1870, Mr. Huggan entered the employ of the Nova Scotia Railway at Halifax. This line ran between Halifax, Pictou, and Windsor. The Intercolonial was then built from Truro to Pansicook, Nova Scotia, and the line was taken over. For a number of years Mr. Huggan has been the District Passenger Agent and is beloved by not only the P. E. I. travelling public but also by those in the service. The Guardian wishes Mr. Huggan many years of continued health and usefulness.

### SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court was resumed yesterday morning at 11 o'clock.

The case of Joseph P. Pineau, Plaintiff, vs. George Houston, Defendant, was heard before Hon. Justice Fitzgerald.

The plaintiff alleged that he had placed a female fox and litter in the ranch of Mr. George Houston and that the foxes had in some way disappeared. He therefore sued for damages.

Mr. G. Gaudet, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. W. E. Bentley, K.C., for defendant.

A number of witnesses were examined, including Mr. Pineau, Mr. Houston, Mr. Ensland, Mr. Clarke and others.

Mr. Gaudet, in submitting his case stated that no evidence had been given to prove that the foxes had been stolen from the ranch and said the defendant merely submitted that to be the case. Mr. Gaudet also called the attention of Mr. Justice Fitzgerald to a case similar in character, which was tried some time ago, in which a decision was given to the plaintiff on the plea of negligence to report the loss of entrusted property.

The Court rendered a verdict for the plaintiff.

This morning the case of Melvor vs. Kennedy will be before the court.

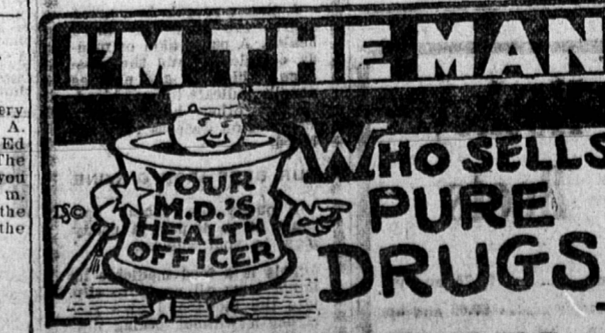
