In sympathy with the chapter read the Christian man and woman who prays should close the door and God who sees in secret would reward openly. Christ was always in the spirit of prayer, and withdrew frequently from the crowd to pray in secret. Mr. Fullerton's remarks were very impressive and were listened to intently.

To those who have attended the Week of Prayer services they will be remembered by the spiritual uplift they have been to all. At the close of the services all ministers present were requested to meet after the meeting dispersed. It is the wish of many that in some form or other these Union meetings may be continued.
