WILLIAMS WILL COMPETE IN BOTH DASHES

ABOARD OLYMPIC SPECIAL TRAIN BOUND FOR VANCOUVER.

GULLUP, N. Mex., July 24.—Percy Williams, only double-winner from Canada in olympic history, will defend both his 100 and 200 metre championships at the Los Angeles games, it was learned from an authoritative source today.

Officials of the Canadian team travelling to Los Angeles with athletes from Canada, Great Britain, South Africa and Hungary received word from Williams that the slim young man who triumphed at both dash distances four years ago at Amsterdam is ready to meet all comers in the California classics.

Decision on the Vancouver flash was something of a surprise as Williams' condition during the past year has been uncertain. It had been expected he would run in only the 100 metres.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Leading teams in the Major Leagues lengthened the margins between them and nearest rivals Saturday. The New York Yankees scored a double triumph over Boston in the American League race.

Pittsburgh Pirates vanquished their closest rivals in the National League, beating Chicago, 11 to 8. The New York Giants sprang a surprise by taking two games from Boston, 3 to 2 in 14 innings and 9 to 0.

Al Marnaux's leading Newark Bears held their position at the top of the International League standing by defeating Jersey City, 7 to 5, Buffalo and Montreal and Toronto and Rochester split double-headers.

Hand-manipulated stop watches will be the official timing devices for the Olympiad under present plans of the International Federation. The electrical timing device used at Berkeley, California in the I.C.A.A.A. meet, however, will be on exhibition during the contests.

Halifax Girl Dropped From Olympic Team

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, July 24—In a special despatch filed at Emporia, Kansas, from the special train carrying Canadian and other Olympic athletes to Los Angeles, the Toronto Star Saturday night said Aileen Meagher of Halifax had been dropped from the women's sprints.

"Forced by international Olympic committee to make a decision today as to Canada's official sprint and relay entries in the girls' section Aileen Meagher was definitely out of Olympic competition. The Canadian committee made this decision today after reports from coach Bobbie Kerr and manager Alexandre Gibb. Miss Meagher has a 'charley horse'." The despatch listed the official entries from Canada, minus Miss Meagher, and added, "This official selection was expected to create a furore in women's sport circles throughout Canada."

what is actually being done in connection with the job elsewhere. Material has been ordered, is being manufactured or fabricated, and collected. The steel is being manufactured at Amherst, New Glasgow, Bridgewater and other points, brick at Pugwash and elsewhere, cut stone is coming from Quebec, the boilers are being manufactured by Bruce Stewart and Co., City. All material is coming in on schedule.

"Notwithstanding bad weather conditions encountered up to the present time we expect the job to be completed in contract time. Mr. Stewart states, "At the moment progress is up to schedule. Two weeks could have been saved by the use of a steam shovel in excavation work, but day labour was used in order that the greatest number of local men possible might be employed. Thus far only two men, the superintendent and the business manager, have been brought here from outside the Province. All others are Prince Edward Island men."

Mr. Stewart also pointed out that a great deal of material to be used is coming from points in the Maritime Provinces, and that most of the remainder will come from other parts of Canada. The construction company had enjoyed the best co-operation from the Provincial Government.

Among buildings which the Stewart Construction Company is now erecting is the Margaret Rogers Memorial Presbyterian Church at La Chute, P. Q., which will be completed in three weeks time, and of which the contract date for completion is Oct. 15. The plant at Bedford P. Q., of the Tourington Company, largest manufacturers of needles in the world, is also being built by the Stewart Construction. The new C. N. R. depot at St. John, N. B. is also being built by this company, and will be completed about Dec. 1. Among the projects which they have undertaken in the past were C. N. R. terminals, Levis P. Q., head offices of the Sherbrooke Trust Company, branches of the Bank of Montreal at Richmond, Victoriaville, Sherbrooke, T. M. Kaning, the MacKinnon Memorial Y. W. C. A. Sherbrooke, P. Q., erected in memory of his wife by Mr. George D. MacKinnon, formerly of Charlottetown.
