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and odor. Of 150 samples collected in the poorer districts, 50 per cent were below the legal standard for butter fat. Of 70 samples collected in hotels 62 per cent were below grade in butter fat. The writer then takes up quite fully the way milk should be cared for to keep it clean and healthful. Copies of this bulletin can be had from the Experiment Station, Urbana, Illinois.

The same station has issued an excellent bulletin on Feeding Farm (or Horses). Pages 30. The problem of feeding farm horses is one involving the economical production of energy, and maintenance of health. It is of considerable importance to know how much hay and how much grain a farm work horse at hard labor should receive in order that he may work with the greatest efficiency and economy. With oats and bran so dear, it is very desirable to know the relative values of clover and timothy hay and oat straw in making up a ration for work horses.

This bulletin contains the results of experiments carried on for this purpose. The following points were observed: (1) Maintenance of weight, (2) health, spirit and ability to endure hard work. (3) economy of ration. Cuts are shown of all the horses used in the experiments.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER TO HAVE A NEW NOSE.

A terrible accident occurred in Ottawa the other day.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the victim. A specialist had to be summoned in haste to the Capital to supply Sir Wilfrid with a new nose.

It was not to the Liberal Chief himself that the mishap occurred, however, but to the splendid bust of him, executed by Paul Chevre, the celebrated French sculptor, which was destined for the rotunda of the Chateau Laurier.

The bust was made by M. Chevre in Paris. He shipped it out on the steamer France, and sailed on the Titanic himself. M. Chevre was one of the survivors of the terrible marine disaster. He went to Ottawa, and a few days later the bust arrived in the Capital. It was carefully inspected and to the great relief of M. Chevre and the Grand Trunk officials it was found that it had come across the Atlantic undamaged.

A few hours later when the workmen were placing the bust on top of the handsome marble pedestal one of them slipped. The bust began to totter. Another workman grasped it to prevent it from falling and the end of the nose was broken off.

M. Chevre was summoned. Sir Wilfrid good-naturedly arranged time for a couple of sittings and a new nose was modelled on to the bust. This was accomplished in time for the opening of the Chateau on Saturday, but the finishing touches had not been completed and the tip of Sir Wilfrid's nose had a rather unnatural appearance.

The general verdict upon the remainder of the work, however, was that it was a splendid likeness of Sir Wilfrid and a very creditable piece of sculpture.

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
