LONDON, June 1. (Special.)—The election in North Essex shows a Liberal gain of 862 votes, the majority being increased from 110 to 972.

## MEMORY RESTORED BY A HYPNOTIC TRANCE.

BUFFALO, May 28.—Joseph J. Kelly, of Providence, R. I., employed by the Rev. E. H. Dickinson in the North Presbyterian Church Sunday night. He told Mr. Dickinson that he had completely lost his memory and asked him to help him find out who he was. Mr. Dickinson took the man to the Police Headquarters, where Supt. Bull questioned him in vain. Among his papers was found but one address, and that Kelly did not recognize.

Drs. James W. Putnam, Floyd S. Crego, William C. Krauss and Police Surgeon Fowler, three of them being alienists of high reputation, were called. Dr. Putnam suggested that they hypnotize the subject and see what he would tell them. He proved a ready subject. Dr. Putnam swung his watch back and forth before Kelly's eyes and commanded him to go to sleep. Kelly fell into a trance almost instantly. The doctor then asked the stranger for his name, and the hypnotic subject promptly answered, giving also his business, age and family connections. He said he had come to Buffalo to see the Exposition. He was then awakened and found to be in semi-normal condition.

He had no recollection of what had occurred since last Friday, when he was in Providence. He had it on his mind, he said to come to Buffalo, but he made no arrangements. Dr. Putnam believes it is a genuine case of double personality. Hypnotism, he says, has been successfully used many times to treat this psychological condition.

Quite a number of anglers were on the scene, the recent prolific catches having made this well-known fishing ground the rendezvous for all the city anglers during the past week.

Mr. Murdoch McLeod, one of the machinists now engaged on the construction of the Hillsborough Bridge had the misfortune on Saturday morning last, to have one of the fingers of his left hand caught in some machinery that was being unloaded at Connolly's wharf. The result of the accident was the painful loss of the top of the finger above the first joint.

## BRITISH CASUALTY

### List Fills Three Columns of the Times

## BOTHA DESIRES PEACE

### Boer Reports of British Losses—Zulus Are on the War Path

## KITCHENER CRITICIZED—BOER REPORT.

LONDON, June 1. (Special.)—The South African casualty list fills three columns of the Times and has loused a flood of criticism against Lord Kitchener for not promptly reporting such facts.

There is inquiry about the truth of Boer reports, that the British were severely beaten near Pretoria May 2, losing 36 killed, 80 wounded, 800 prisoners and six guns.

## BOTHA WANTS TO HAVE PEACE.

The War Office says there is no official confirmation of the report.

Botha has arrived at Standerton and is in communication by telegraph with Kruger appealing to him to sue for peace.

## THE ZULUS ON THE WARPATH.

Report says also that ten thousand Zulus are on the war-path against Boer raids.
