duce also the cost of implements of production required for the efficient development of the natural resources of the Dominion;

That while keeping this aim clearly in mind, the House recognizes that in any readjustment of the tariff that may take place, regard must be had to existing conditions of trade, and changes made in such a manner as will cause the least possible disturbance of business.

..INSTITUTE MEETING.—The regular meeting of the Georgetown Institute was held in the Council Room on Thursday evening with an attendance of twenty members and three visitors. The President referred to the loss sustained in the death of Mr. A. D. McDonald, Town Clerk, in whom the Institute had always found a courteous and helpful friend and a vote of sympathy was expressed for Mrs. McDonald and family. The members expressed strong disapproval of the unusual prevalence in cigarette smoking among the younger boys of the town and this with other matters relating to community welfare, caused quite a discussion. All the members were urged to attend the school meeting. The meeting closed as usual with the National Anthem.

..BASEBALL.—The second series of baseball matches was held at Georgetown on Friday June 3rd, between the Tigers of Georgetown and Murray River. The game was marked by a number of splendid plays on both sides. The game ended in favor of Georgetown 9-6. At the end of the first innings the score was 1-3 in favor of Georgetown. In the second again Georgetown and Murray River equal. In the third innings 1-1, the fourth 2-0 in favor of Georgetown. The fifth 1-1, the sixth 2-1 in favor of Murray River's favor. Mr. McISAAC: I know why the hon. gentleman exclaims "dispense". He is ashamed of this amendment.

The House regrets that, after repeated assurances by the government of an intention to have a revision of the Customs tariff, and after a protracted inquiry extending from ocean to ocean by a committee of cabinet ministers, the government have made no proposals for any reduction of the tariff.

That while recognizing that existing financial requirements of the Dominion demand the maintenance of a Customs tariff, the House is unable to concur in the declaration by the government that the tariff should be based on the principle of protection; the tariff is a tax, and the aim of legislation should be to make taxation as light as circumstances will permit.

That the aim of the fiscal policy of Canada should be the encouragement of industries based on the natural resources of the country, the development of which may reasonably be expected to create healthy enterprises giving promise of enduring success.

That such changes should be made in the Customs duties as may be expected to reduce the high cost of living, and also to re-

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 3.
 Abandonment of government operations of the Newfoundland railway system was announced today. The railway commission consisting of three members appointed by the cabinet and three of the Reid-Newfoundland Company, owners of the system, will be dissolved on June 30 and the railway will be returned to the company for operation. The company sustained a loss of nearly \$1,400,000 in its operation of the system for the year ending in June, 1920, and it is estimated that the loss for the current year under government control will be greater. Officials of the company declared that it was impossible to operate the railway under present conditions without substantial financial help from the colony, but made an announcement of future plans.

I shall not therefore, keep hon. gentlemen any longer in

suspense; I know they are anxious to get relief, so I shall be generous to them in that respect. I thank you, Mr. Speaker and hon. gentlemen of the House for the attention which has been given to my remarks.
