THE JAPANESE TROUBLE WITH UNITED STATES

THE FRENCH FLAG PULLED DOWN

Fish Poachers Use Dynamite

ARMY IS NOT GOOD ENOUGH FOR THEM

VICTORIA, B. C., June 12.—The military authorities at Work Point Barracks, the headquarters for the regular Canadian militia on the Pacific Coast, are having a rather hard time keeping the men under their charge from deserting. It is the general opinion among the men that they are wasting their time in the army with wages as they are at present. They are of the opinion that there are openings in the West for any person who is desirous of taking advantage of them, and they are not going to let the opportunity slip by. The deserters adopt very novel methods of disguising themselves in order to make good their escape, and some very funny experiences are told of those who have been captured. Recently two of the Imperial soldiers made an attempt to desert, but they were located on board the Seattle steamer. They were sentenced to ten days in the guard room. A sentry was placed over them. One morning the sentry in charge went to relieve the guard and was surprised to find not only the two offenders gone, but also the guard.

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
