Action To Protect U. S. Banks

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Thirty six hours after the United States Government had armed itself with sweeping powers to protect National banks against public hysteria, bankers in parts of Ohio and Indiana followed the lead of those in other states where restrictions have already been placed on withdrawals by depositors.

The Michigan bank situation seemed to be clearing with Henry Ford throwing financial aid into the breach, but imposition of banking restrictions was spreading in Ohio early today and banks in Indianapolis, Ind., announced restrictions on withdrawals until further notice. Maryland officials also sought solution of the problem that forced a three-day suspension of banking.

Early Monday morning the seven member banks of the Cleveland, Ohio, clearing house association announced that effective immediately withdrawals by depositors would be limited temporarily to five percent. The five banks of Akron, Ohio, previously had agreed to proceed with business Monday on a "restricted withdrawal basis" while the City Commission of Dayton, Ohio, declared a three-day bank holiday.

Governor George White of Ohio promised early introduction of legislation to avoid declaration of a state-wide holiday.

"Unusual withdrawals by persons hoarding or by persons withdrawing for other than business reasons" was given as the reason for the Indianapolis restrictions.

The federal legislation adopted at Washington Saturday, a product of Michigan's Canadian-born Senator, James Couzens, would

provide among other things for "freezing" the assets of National banks in states where such emergency action was deemed necessary.
