THE LATE MR. G. A. AITKEN, GEORGETOWN
In the death of Mr. George Albert Aitken, which occurred yesterday morning, Georgetown has lost one of its most highly esteemed citizens and the community. Although in somewhat delicate health for some time no apprehension was felt as to any serious developments until Saturday when a sudden turn for the worse came. His daughter, Miss Jean, of the Provincial Library staff, and his only brother, Mr. W. H. Aitken, head of the firm of Carvell Brothers, the only absent members of his family, were summoned by telephone and they reached his bedside before the end came. Besides these there are left to mourn his widow, formerly Miss Belle Ross, daughter of the late Mr. John Ross, Charlottetown, the well known journalist of his day, three daughters, Mrs. Frank D. McDonald, Georgetown, Miss Estelle, at home and Miss Jean above mentioned, also two sisters, Mrs. Tupper and Miss Hanna Aitken, Georgetown.
The late Mr. Aitken, who was in his 78th year, for some forty years was clerk of the County Court of King's and was also Deputy Prothonotary for the county, positions which he filled with marked ability and to the satisfaction of the many with whom he came in contact. He was for many years chairman of the Town assessors and after the town was incorporated was elected its first Mayor. He was a public spirited citizen, actively interested in all that made for the betterment of his town and country, and his place in the community will not soon be filled.
