The late Mr. Charles Samuel Drew, a director of the firm of Moore & McLeod Limited, was a most estimable citizen and prominent business man.

He was taken ill about two weeks ago and underwent an operation for appendicitis in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Later pneumonia developed and he passed away Friday night.

Mr. Drew was born in Charlottetown in 1875 and was the son of Charles W. Drew and Jane Rider Jarvis, of Devonshire, England.

When a young man he began his commercial career as clerk in the drygoods house of Perkins & Sterns.

In 1893 Messrs. Moore & McLeod took over the business, and Mr. Drew continued in their employ.

Some years ago when the firm was incorporated he became a director of Moore & McLeod Limited, in charge of the silk and girls' ready-to-wear department. He was also buyer for that department.

His long and intimate knowledge of the dry goods business, his fidelity and ability made him a valued member of the firm. His death marks the first break in a partnership in which the most friendly relations existed between all the members.

Mr. Drew was a prominent Odd-fellow. He was treasurer of Wilsey Lodge for a number of years, a Past Grand Master, Past Chief Patriarch of the Encampment, and secretary treasurer of the Odd-fellows Hall Company.

For a number of years he was a member of the Masonic Order. He took an active interest in Y.M.C.A. activities, and was an adherent of Trinity United Church. Mr. Drew is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mamie Gillespie, to whom such sympathy is extended.
