MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 15.—(Livestock)—There were 37 calves, 306 hogs and 1559 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. Calves offered were common grassers and brought around \$3.50. Good ewes and wethers were steady at \$7.75. Culls and bucks were discounted \$2 per cwt. Sheep brought from \$2.50 to \$3.50. Hog prices under recent heavy offerings were a shade easier. Bacon

and butchers brought \$12. Selects \$1 per hog. Premium sows were mostly \$10.

TO TEACH GIRLS POISE

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 15.—A new course of instruction to instill "social poise" in students of Temple University is to be inaugurated, according to Miss Gertrude D. Peabody, dean of women.

ed to visit France, has not recovered from his annoyance over the incident, and if he ever had a sense of humor it has been crowded into the background by more intense emotions. Instead of taking his licking and keeping quiet about it, he is shouting his distress from the housetops, the while he endeavors to pose as a martyr to international injustice. His latest complaint is that the government of the United States has not taken steps to rebuke France for its treatment of him.
