With the object of guarding young Freshmen from going astray when they first come to Montreal, all the Freshmen attending McGill will this year be divided into groups, each of which will be headed by a senior student or popular junior. In this way, it is hoped, that dangers surrounding youths far from home will be guarded against. Some years ago the Faculty of Applied Science resolved to divide its Freshmen class into groups, each of which was placed in charge of a junior lecturer, whose task it was to play the part of general moral adviser and father confessor. The scheme proved successful as far as it went, but owing to the fact that the other faculties did not adopt it, its real scope could not be realized. This year Dr. Cyrus McMillan, a graduate of McGill and Harvard, has interested himself in the work and its adoption will be largely due to his activity. Freshmen at Harvard are divided into sections, each of which is placed under the special supervision of a leading senior student or a popular junior member of the faculty. The degree of surveillance exercised contains no element of the coercive. It is aimed to gain the full confidences of the students, to see that they secure comfortable lodgings, and to forearm them against the temptations of a great city like Montreal. Such a step will mean a lot to the future of McGill, whose ever-growing cosmopolitan nature involves ever-increasing problems and dangers. Montreal Exc. TORONTO, Sept. 18.—There are rumors of a proposed amalgamation of the Dominion Steel Corporation of Sydney and Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company of New Glasgow with an increase of capital to \$75,000,000 and undertaking of contracts for battleships for Russia and other powers also linking Canadian Steel Co. of Hamilton in the matter. By this arrangement the whole British consular service is rendered available to Canadian business men, and the means simultaneously are provided for building up a distinctively Canadian consular service under the best auspices. TRIP TO COAL MINES.

GLACE BAY, Sept. 17.—The technical schools in Glace Bay are to be resumed again this month. The coal mining class promises to be larger than ever before, and it will be again in charge of John McDonald. This particular class should and no doubt will prove very interesting this season in view of the recent trip of Mr. McDonald and other mining instructors, to some of the large coal centers around Pittsburg, where they secured knowledge that will prove of great value to themselves and the pupils under their instruction.

Mr. McDonald and his associates first visited the U. S. Government experimental mine at Pittsburg, where they witnessed explosive tests being made with gas and coal dust, and coal dust alone. The laboratories in connection with the mine and where the natural gasses are tested were also visited. At this mine the visitors gained a large amount of valuable data that is bound to help along the students this winter.
