SAYS CANADA ANXIOUS FOR PREFERENCE

OTTAWA, Feb. 26—Canada is anxious to take advantage of trade preferences and agreements with Newfoundland, just as she is with any other portion of the British Empire, so far as the government of the Dominion is concerned, declared Hon. James Macleod, minister of trade and commerce, commenting today upon a statement made recently by Sir Richard Squires, Premier of Newfoundland.

Sir Richard is quoted as having said that there was a difference of attitude among Canadian and United States business men and government officials with regard to proposals for preferential trade relations with Newfoundland.

PROJECT OF CANAL TO BE INVESTIGATED

OTTAWA, Feb. 26.—The House tonight approved a resolution calling for an immediate investigation of the project to build a canal across the Isthmus of Chignecto, which connects the provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The investigation is to go into questions of feasibility, cost of construction and economic and national advantages to be gained from the construction of such a waterway. R. K. Smith, Conservative member for Cumberland, was the author of the resolution which passed in amended form. At the suggestion of Minister of Railways and Canals, Hon. C. A. Dunning Mr. Smith agreed to delete a final paragraph from the resolution which would have committed the Government to construction of the canal on the completion of the investigation. Mr. Dunning made no objection to the passing of the resolution for holding the investigation.

PRINCE ACTS FOR FATHER

LONDON, Feb. 26.—A snowfall this morning brought disappointment to Londoners who had hoped to see the Prince of Wales drive in state from Buckingham Palace to St. James Palace to hold the season's first levee on behalf of King George. Because of the bad weather the state procession was cancelled and the Prince merely walked over the short distance from his residence in York House, wearing his brilliant scarlet uniform as Colonel of the Welsh Guard. He was escorted by members of his staff and household officials in glittering uniforms. The scene inside the Palace was a brilliant one. There was a large attendance of privileged personages who were received by the Prince in the Throne Room with all customary ceremony surrounding the state function. It was the first time the Prince had ever acted for his father at a levee.

The Markets

(Special to the Guardian)
OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 26.—Eggs—While egg markets continued firm today there appears to be a note of uneasiness in the situation due largely to the sudden drop in Chicago prices yesterday. The Chicago spot market today is unchanged from yesterday.

TORONTO—The local egg market is firm and unchanged. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned, extras 45-48; firsts 43-46; pullet extras 38-42; seconds 35. The situation, however, is somewhat nervous due to the uncertainty of the American markets. No important purchase have been reported yet.

MONTREAL—The egg market firm and active for consumptive requirements. British Columbia are selling on spot at extras 51; firsts 49; pullet extras 47, which prices are a cent lower than those previously prevailing.

WINNIPEG—Egg receipts here continue to decline and prices are working higher. Dealers are now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned, extras 42-45; firsts 40-42; seconds 30-32. Prices for fresh eggs to retailers are extras 50; firsts 48; seconds 42.

CHARLOTTETOWN—Egg production on P. E. I. is very good for the season. Dealers are quoting at country points: extras 30; firsts 27; seconds 23.

MONTREAL, Que. Feb. 26.—The local and export trade in Canadian grain here today was again of a limited character but the tone of the market was steady. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were well maintained under a small inquiry. The undertone to the millfed market was fair with a moderate trade passing all lines. Standard grades of rolled oats were unchanged. An active business was done in all grades of fresh and storage eggs, and values were firm. Receipts were 2,010 cases. The inquiry for butter showed a slight improvement and values were steady. Receipts were 1,131 packages. The cheese trade continued dull and featureless. Receipts were 660 boxes. A fair trade was done in all grades of beans. Canadian white handpicked sold at \$5.75 per bushel, and yellow eye beans were quoted at \$4.40 per bushel. The trade in potatoes was moderately active and values were unchanged. Prince Edward Island green mountains sold at 80 cents and whites at 75 cents per 90 lbs. in bags, and N. B. green mountains sold at 55c and whites at 50 cents per 90 lbs. in bulk.

DUNCAN, Miss. Feb. 26.—A heavy wind storm swept through this village this afternoon and killed at least 11 persons and left the business section in ruins. Estimates of the injured ranged as high as 100.

is Now Able to Take An Interest in the Events Which Occurred During His Illness.

(Canadian Press)
BOGNOR, Sussex, Feb. 26.—Although King George's bedroom windows had to be closed all day today owing to grey skies and a biting east wind, His Majesty passed a good day. It was officially stated. He sat up for some time.

The King's progress since his arrival at Craigwell House has been such that he is now able to take an interest in the events which occurred during the long period of his illness, when he was unable to read newspapers or be made acquainted with what was happening, it was learned today on high authority. He is gradually beginning to pick up the threads of current events. His Majesty also spends some time each day reading newspapers. He is gradually assimilating all that transpired since he became seriously ill, but in order that he may not be unduly fatigued the process is very slow.

Princess Mary, who had to postpone her visit to Craigwell house owing to a cold last week arrived today at noon. This was the first time the Princess had seen her father for three weeks.

LATER Sends Message to Air Force

The King today gave an indication of the improved state of his health by sending a personal message to the Air Minister, Sir Samuel Hoare, conveying his congratulations on the rescue work of the Royal Air Force at Kabul, Afghanistan. The message, which was signed by His Majesty, said: "I heartily congratulate the Royal Air Force on its great feat of rescuing so many men, women and children from Kabul in spite of many difficulties in the air and on the ground."

It is now understood that the R. A. F. carried more than 580 persons from Kabul to Peshawar in 83 planes, most of the flying being done at an average height of 12,000 feet. In authoritative quarters this is regarded as a remarkable feat as the operation was effected in the depths of a most rigorous winter over very mountainous country without a single casualty.

resolution on the treaty for remedial measures in connection with the Niagara Falls.

The first proposed to refer a large portion of the estimate to a private and select committee of the House. It, offers to save the time of members in committee of the whole and to make provision against the talking out of private bills, a practice that was greatly abused last session.

The first part of the report was in accordance with the suggestion of the prime minister himself.

The reports, however, got a severe body check from Mr. Neill, Comex, Alberta, independent liberal, in a speech punctuated by much humor the British Columbia member jumped on the report with both feet, with the result that on his own motion discussion of the report was adjourned to give members a chance to think it over.

The prime minister's resolution, approved of the Niagara Falls remedial works and the experimental withdrawal of additional water to the extent of 10,000 cubic feet per minute to each side of the line. This treaty was signed at Ottawa in January last by representatives of the United States and Canadian governments appointed for the purpose. The prime minister made a brief statement, after which Church, Toronto, and the Hon. J. D. Chaplin, Lincoln, twenty years a member of the Niagara Falls committee opposed it in strong speeches. Mr. Chaplin was particularly vigorous. The contentions were that it was to the greater advantage of the United States, that it was purely a power proposition, rather than one to preserve the beauty of the Falls and that no private interests should be permitted to exploit the falls for such purposes. The Hon. Mr. Stewart, Minister of the Interior, replied at length, and the prime minister then adjourned the debate. Private bills were then introduced to loan \$10,000,000 and \$3,000,000 to Vancouver and Harbour Commissioners respectively.
