Proportionate Mileage Proposed By Trade Board

At a meeting of the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade on Saturday morning, a wire from Mr. W. U. Appleton was read, and the matter of the drastic cut in railway services proposed to be effective in Prince Edward Island on September 21st, was further considered. President Tweedy was authorized to wire Mr. Appleton as follows.

Sept. 19, 1931

W. U. Appleton, Manager Atlantic Region C. N. R. Moncton, N. B.

Your wire of 18th, considered at meeting of Board this morning. Our Board fully realizes need of economies in railway operations and necessity that Prince Edward Island should share in same. If it becomes necessary that operation of Maritime Express or Ocean Limited be discontinued we will, of course, approve discontinuance of our connection with same. Our view is that under Prince Edward Island's terms of Confederation our connections with the through mainland trains carrying mails and passengers must be continued. Proportionate mileage reduction on local services with that proposed for Nova Scotia and New Brunswick is the utmost that our Board would approve.

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Sept. 19 - Sir Thomas Oliver, President of the Institute of Hygiene, commended the modern dress of women in a speech at Letchworth. On the other hand he said, men were certainly overclad, and compared to women, their clothing was cumbersome, heavy and unhygienic. Sir Thomas was addressing the conference of British cordierers, and he said that women did not dress specially to attract the opposite sex, but largely to compete with each other.

"Taken altogether," he added, "there is much in the modern dress of women to commend it from a health point of view as well as the aesthetic. But there is nothing attractive about male attire; in fact for men, the day of elegance in dress and of dandyism has gone and with it much of the courtly manners of an age that is past."

In spite of the dress reform party, Sir Thomas said he did not observe in men any evidence of a great desire to change their clothing, but it was not so long since women's dress, with its numerous petticoats, was equally heavy and unhealthy.
